Mostly everyone procrastinates at some point in college. Procrastination can include being easily distracted, finding a class boring, lack of time management, feeling overwhelmed, etc. Either way, procrastination can cause more stress on us. Here are a few tips to help overcome procrastination:

Tip #1 Know when to study

Create a calendar and set a schedule of the times of your classes, work and other personal responsibilities. With the remaining openings, block out time for your studying. Use the "50/10" rule. This means spending 50 minutes studying one subject and then taking a 10 minute break before studying another subject. Make sure to study during the part of the day you are most focused. Also, try studying your most difficult, or even boring, subjects first.

Tip #2 Know where to study

You may have the best intentions to study, but still find yourself procrastinating. This may be in part due to where you study. If you study on top of your bed, you may lay down and fall asleep. Or if you study on the couch, your attention may turn to the TV. Find a regular study area and a place where you are not too comfortable or distracted. Quiet areas like the school library can be great places where you are more focused on studying and less on procrastinating.

Tip #3 Find a study group or accountability buddy

Don't just find any random person to study with. You want someone that cares about his/ her education and someone that will hold you accountable. This will help make you feel responsible for your own actions and study habits. With all of you working together, you may be able to answer questions or understand concepts better that you otherwise had difficulty with.

Tip #4 Reward yourself

Sometimes rewarding yourselves for completing a difficult project or final can be extra motivation to finish strong. Whether the reward is going to the movies or buying a caramel frappuccino, you are giving yourself something to look forward to.

Spotlight on: Graduation Check

What is a graduation check?

Undergraduate students need to submit a graduation requirement check (grad check) through the Registration Office in UH-171 prior to the end their expected graduation quarter. Students should not request the grad check until they have earned 135 quarter units toward their degree (including work in progress).

Is there a fee?

Yes. The fee for filing a grad check the first time is \$25 for each major/option requested. There is a \$20 late fee for each major/option for a grad check filed after the deadline.

What if I do not complete my requirements?

Students who do not complete the requirements in the term for which the grad check was filed must re-file their grad check. There is a \$20 fee for an updated and revised grad check for each major/option requested (late fee applies if after deadline).

What are the upcoming deadlines?

- Grad Check deadlines for Fall 2014 and Winter 2015 have passed (late fee applies).
- Grad Check deadline for Spring 2015 is November 3, 2014.
