Whenever possible, every effort is made to partner with students to develop a personalized success plan focusing on their strengths and empowering them to be positively connected within the campus community.

Students are a reflection of the life-long Coyote legacy in and out of the classroom, their community, workplace and the world. Being a part of the Coyote community includes responsibilities for students to safeguard the integrity of CSUSB's academic mission in their course-work in the classroom and ethical behaviors out of the classroom. Students are also encouraged to report when a peer may be in need of help (i.e. not going to class, not being themselves, experienced a death in the family). This will allow the office to conduct positive outreach to your peer/friend and provide them with information about resources and support services that may be available.

The office also serves students in the following ways:

- Staff is available as a resource, for consultation, and to provide educational workshops, presentations, and to explore partnerships with student clubs or organizations upon request.
- Student academic dishonesty and behavioral complaints, questions, or concerns shall be directed to the Office of Student Conduct and Ethical Development at 909.537.7172 or student-conduct@csusb.edu.
- The office continues to establish partnerships with campus units and student involvement to promote proactive educational initiatives, programs, and opportunities. Examples include the annual Academic Integrity Awareness Week and Coyote Connections.

Ask Michael: Test Anxiety

Some students experience some level of test anxiety during an exam. We asked admissions recruiter/counselor and CSUSB alumnus, Michael Harrison on managing test anxiety.

- Q: Do all students suffer from test anxiety?
- A: Not all students suffer from test anxiety, but it is estimated that between 16-20 percent of students have high test anxiety.
- Q: Does exercise or walking help?
- A: Incorporating exercise into your daily routine will help you focus better. Walking can be a good stress reliever and a way to clear your mind.
- Q: Does sleep really impact how I do on a test?
- A: Proper sleep allows the body to reboot and restore itself. Proper rest can also allow information to be processed and help with memory recall.
- Q: What else can I do? Does tutoring work?
- A: The more prepared a student is, the less likely he or she is to suffer from test anxiety. Preparation builds confidence. Tutoring helps you to become more familiar with the material you will be tested on. Another tip is to take a blank piece of paper and write out what you can recall about a topic.
- Q: Is there anyone I can talk to?
- A: From The Learning Center for tutoring, faculty from your classes, counselors at the Psychological Counseling Center, workshops from the Center of Health Education and Wellness, there are many resources available on campus that can be very valuable for students. Also studying with a friend and quizzing each other can build confidence in the material. A lot of test anxiety comes of lack of preparation so study, study, study!!
