

Grade Forgiveness

What is grade forgiveness?

Grade forgiveness is the process whereby a new grade replaces a former grade when calculating GPA. The first attempt will remain on the transcript, with a footnote indicating that the course has been repeated. The first attempt will not be calculated in the GPA or units earned

Who can request grade forgiveness?

Undergraduate students may request grade forgiveness in a repeated course by petition only. Petitions for Grade Forgiveness should be filed after completion of the course used to replace the previous course.

How do I petition for grade forgiveness and where do I go?

To petition, complete the form "Petition for Grade Forgiveness" for Undergraduate Students and submit to the Records, Registration and Evaluations Office in UH-171. Click here for the Petition for Grade Forgiveness (PDF).

How do I know if I can repeat a class?

Courses may only be repeated if the grade earned is less than a "C". A course may be repeated for grade forgiveness no more than two times. If a "C" or better was previously earned in the course you are attempting to repeat, you will be prevented from enrolling or dropped from this class. 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

Here are 5 tips for surviving your summer classes:

Tip #1 Create a schedule

Whether you are using your smartphone or old-fashioned pen and paper, make a schedule listing your upcoming mid-terms, quizzes, homework assignments, readings, etc. This is a great tool to use during any term, especially summer.

Tip #2 Be realistic

Choose classes that are realistic and fit your schedule. Since two of the summer sessions are just 6 weeks long, don't overload yourself. Keep in mind the classes you are taking and also your obligations outside of school. Also, do not plan any major outings during the time you are in classes because you may need that extra time to study, complete assignments, etc.

Tip #3 Meet with your advisor

Even if you don't have an advising hold with your major doesn't mean you still shouldn't see your advisor. What does your advisor suggest you take during summer? Should you take a GE or a course for your major? Are there any prerequisite courses for your major you need to take? See your advisor!

Tip #4 Don't procrastinate

Summer classes move quickly, so you have no time to put off your assignments. Instructors may have readings and other assignments to be completed by the following class time. Quizzes and mid-terms may also be given more frequently. Make sure to complete your readings and other assignments as soon as possible!

Tip #5 Attendance

Sure, attendance seems obvious, but being absent for one day could mean missing pertinent information. For example, if your class is Mondays and Wednesdays from 8 a.m.-11:50 a.m. and you are absent one of those days, you have now missed close to four hours of lecture for the week.
