The practices and norms of public memory have changed in the decades since World War II creating a new "global memory culture." The former "comfort women," who served in Japan's military brothels across wartime Asia, played a role in this transformation, helping to change attitudes toward sexual violence and women's rights -- helping, in short, to change the world.

Carol Gluck is George Sansom Professor of History at Columbia University. She specializes in modern Japan; international relations; World War II, and history-writing and public memory in Asia and the West. She received her B.A. from Wellesley (1962) and her Ph.D. from Columbia (1977). She is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and the American Philosophical Society, and former President of the Association for Asian Studies.
