INTRODUCTION

The Inland Empire Research Consortium (IERC) is pleased to present the 2000 San Bernardino County Special Zone Edition of the Inland Empire Annual Survey. Reflecting a major concern of SANBAG (San Bernardino Associated Governments), one of our major sponsors, this Special Zone Edition presents the annual survey findings for San Bernardino county, broken down into four regions: East Valley, West Valley, Desert, and Victor Valley. An annual Riverside County Special Zone Edition has also been prepared by request of RCTC (Riverside County Transportation Commission), another of our major sponsors. Further, the main Inland Empire Annual Survey report compares the results for the two counties.

The IERC represents a partnership between researchers from the Institute of Applied Research and Policy Analysis at CSUSB and the Center for Social and Behavioral Sciences Research at UCR. The purpose of the IERC is to conduct the Inland Empire Annual Survey each year and to focus on policy-related research pertaining to issues important to the Inland Empire region.

THE QUESTIONNAIRE

Questionnaire items reported in this Special Zone Edition were selected on the following basis: Several questions were incorporated from previous annual surveys of Riverside and San Bernardino counties for the purpose of tracking changes over time in the residents' perceptions about their quality of life and economic well-being, their views about the pressing issues of the day, and their ratings of public services and agencies. In addition, a number of standard demographic questions were also included for tracking purposes and for cross tabulation of findings. Tracking questions provide public agencies and business with trend data often needed in policy making and outcome assessments. Finally, the researchers also added proprietary questions that address data needs of special relevance to the contributors to this survey.

A draft copy of the questionnaire was submitted to the sponsors for their approval and modified where warranted. A Spanish version of the questionnaire was also produced. The survey instrument was then pre-tested, and some minor changes to the wording and order of some items were made. The questionnaire is attached as Appendix I.

SAMPLING METHODS

Telephone survey respondents were randomly selected from a comprehensive sample frame consisting of all telephone working blocks which contain residential telephone numbers in Riverside and San Bernardino Counties. This is a standard random sampling approach for studies of this nature. In order to ensure accuracy of findings, 2,238 residents were surveyed from the two-county area for a 95 percent level of confidence and an accuracy of approximately plus/minus 2 percent for overall two-county findings.

Sample size of the two counties varied slightly due to the over-sampling of some of the regional zones in San Bernardino and Riverside Counties. As a result, 1,096 residents of San Bernardino County were surveyed, for an accuracy of at a plus or minus 2.8 percent and 95 percent level of confidence.

To ensure an acceptable accuracy of findings within each of these regions, a sample size of at least 200 respondents was required. The accuracy of the zone data presented in this Special Edition, however, varies depending on the number of respondents sampled within each zone.

Due to weighting considerations to remove the effects of the over-sampling, the reader will note a discrepancy between the actual sample size and the total number of cases reported in the data tables for San Bernardino County as a whole. For the list of cities within each zone, see Appendix II.

Telephone interviews were conducted by the Institute of Applied Research at California State University, San Bernardino using computer assisted telephone interviewing (CATI) equipment and software. The surveys were conducted between October 13, 2000 and December 1, 2000.

INTRODUCTION TO FINDINGS

As a preface to the zone findings, a few general comments are in order. As highlighted in the Inland Empire Survey Annual Report dealing with the two-county area, the commonly held belief that San Bernardino and Riverside County residents differ dramatically in attitudes, opinions, and beliefs is generally dispelled. Instead two county residents were found to be remarkably similar in their ratings of the Inland Empire as a place to live, perceptions about the economy and quality of life, evaluations of public services, views about major issues, and beliefs about social and political philosophies. But as this report illustrates there are more differences *within* each county than there are *between* counties.

This report includes a sufficient number of data points (4 surveys, conducted from 1997 to 2000) to conduct more extensive and more valid trend analyses than in previous reports, both for the two-county area as a whole and for each individual county.

THE FINDINGS

RATINGS OF THE COUNTY

OVERVIEW: *Within each zone, the majority of residents rate San Bernardino County as a good place to live, citing nice living area, low crime, “not crowded,” affordable housing, and good schools as important factors in their evaluation of county life. Respondents continue to cite high crime as the “worst” thing about living in the county, even (for the first time) in the Desert area. Smog returns to this year’s list of the most negative things about county life, and traffic congestion is mentioned in the West Valley.*

Consistent with last year’s findings, the majority of zone residents rate the County as a good or very good place to live. Responding to the question, “Overall, how would you rate your county as a place to live?” As in the last report, West valley residents gave the County the highest ratings and East Valley residents the lowest. The other two zones fell in between the two extremes.

Countywide, the predominant reasons for positive ratings of the county (“very good” or “fairly good”) included: Nice living area, low crime, “not crowded,” affordable housing, and good schools. These findings matched those from previous annual surveys. There were some differences between zones, however. For example, 19% of West Valley respondents noted low crime, as opposed to only 7% of East Valley respondents. Also, more West Valley respondents cited “good schools” as a reason for their positive opinions than did respondents in other zones. Further, Victor Valley and Desert respondents mentioned good air quality as a positive quality of their county, whereas very few East or West Valley respondents noted that characteristic.

For the few zone residents who view the County as either a “fairly bad” or “very bad” place to live, the only reason of significance offered was “high crime” (mentioned by 27 East Valley respondents out of the 54 with negative feelings about the county).

To further probe respondents’ views about their counties, *all* respondents (regardless of whether they thought their county was a good or bad place to live) were asked to indicate the one BEST and one MOST NEGATIVE thing about living in the county. Countywide, respondents felt that the BEST things included: Good central location, climate/temperature, affordable housing, affordable cost of living/low taxes, not crowded, good living area, and proximity to the mountains/desert/beach areas. Although the zones are relatively similar with respect to responses offered, some significant differences do exist. East Valley respondents, for example, cite “close to mountains” as an important positive factor, whereas this was rarely mentioned by respondents from other zones. Victor Valley and Desert respondents also differed from other zones in citing good air quality as one of the best things about living in their area.

When zone residents were asked to respond to the question “In your opinion what is the ONE most negative thing about living in the county,” high crime led the list of complaints *in all zones*, whereas last year it was not the leading issue for the Desert Zone. In 3 of 4 zones,

however, fewer people mentioned it than last year (although all changes were within or *nearly* within the margin of error). Specifically, 32% of East Valley residents (down 2% from last year), 16% of West Valley residents (down 3% from last year), and 13% of Victor Valley residents (down 7% from last year) cited crime as the most negative thing about living in the County. On the other hand, this year 15% of Desert respondents mentioned crime, up from 12% last year, which in turn was up from 7% the previous year. These findings suggest that Desert residents may increasingly be seeing crime as a significant problem in their area. These findings may also suggest that the Desert area, which at one time was perceived as significantly different from the other 3 zones in makeup, attitudes, and beliefs, may be increasingly coming to resemble the other areas due to marked population increase and its attendant problems.

Last year, we noted that air pollution had dramatically disappeared as a highly salient negative thing about County life in the minds of respondents. This year it has returned in two of the four zones.

One final comment about the “negative things” noted by respondents. Traffic congestion was listed by West Valley respondents (unlike respondents in the other three zones) as one of the most negative things about living in the county.

ECONOMIC EVALUATIONS AND FUTURE PROSPECTS

OVERVIEW: Significant differences exist among zone residents over the state of the county’s economy, with most of the respondents in three of four zones rating the economy only as “fair.” In contrast West Valley respondents predominantly rate the economy as “good” or “excellent.” The vast majority of zone residents, however, indicate that their family finances have either improved or stayed the same as last year. There is a mixed picture of the County’s economy and personal finances, however the majority of respondent in all four zones expecting to be better off by next year.

When asked the baseline question “In general, how would you rate the economy in the county today,” San Bernardino County residents have remained consistent (and not overwhelmingly positive) in their responses over the past three years. As pointed out last year, there is one notable exception. Within the West Valley, most people rate the economy as “excellent” or “good,” although there has been a significant drop in those ratings from last year (see Table 3). In the other three zones, however the most-often mentioned rating is only “fair.” This has been relatively consistent (within the margin of error) over time. It should also be noted, that in these zones a substantial number of respondents stated that the economy is “poor” (13% in East Valley, 15% in Victor Valley, and 18% in the Desert).

In addition to rating the economic well being of the county, respondents offered their perceptions about their own *personal* economic well being. Responding to the question “In comparison to a year ago, would you say that you and your family are better off, worse off, or the same,” the vast majority of respondents in all four zones (85% or more) generally reported being either “the same” or “better off.” Further, the majority of respondents in three out of the four zones expect to be “better off” in terms of their family finances a year from now. Only Desert respondents are slightly less optimistic about their future financial prospects, with only 47% expecting their finances to improve over the next year. An even more impressive display of optimism is that less than 5% of respondents in any zone feel that they will be “worse off” than they are now. These findings are generally consistent with those in the last report.

Another indicator of personal economic well being is the question: “Thinking about your household income, would you say that it is *enough so that you can save money* or buy some extras, *just enough to meet your bills and obligations*, or *is it not enough to meet your bills and*

obligations?” Consistent with last year’s findings, a substantial number of people within all zones indicated that money was tight and that they had just enough to pay their bills. In addition, a troubling number indicated that they don’t have enough money to meet their bills and obligations (17% in the Desert – up from 10% last year, 12% in Victor Valley – down from 17% last year). There is clearly a polarization occurring between the 35% – 42% (depending on the zone) indicating that they have enough money to save and buy extras, vs. those who report being somewhat strapped for funds.

On the other hand, the vast majority of respondents in all zones view the purchase of a house as an “excellent” or “good” investment, reflecting the increase in the County’s housing prices over the last year.

Finally, another indicator in the mixed picture about the economy is the fear about losing a job. Over 70% of the respondents in all zones express no concern whatsoever about losing their job. But this seemingly rosy picture must be interpreted in light of the fact that the figures are slightly more negative this year when compared to last, particularly in the Desert. Further, when our respondents were asked to offer reasons why some college graduates are leaving the area after graduation, the most common response in all zones was that there are not enough high paying jobs in the area. Whether or not this response is an accurate indicator of why people leave the area is of course open to question. What is *not* open to debate is that the common response (“not enough high paying jobs”) reflects a general and pervasive perception about the county’s economic base.

Generally, then, our findings are consistent with what one would expect in a “class society.” While the future continues to brighten for some respondents, the trend is not uniform. There are still a substantial number of individuals who believe their economic situation is fairly marginal, particularly in the Desert zone. It is important to note, however, that these survey findings reflect opinions prior to (or concurrent with) three important events: (1) the presidential election, (2) the energy crisis, and (3) the marked slowdown in the national and local economies, with an accompanying drop in consumer confidence.

MOST IMPORTANT COMMUNITY PROBLEM

OVERVIEW: Crime (and crime-related activity) continues to be perceived as the most important city or community problem.

Zone residents continue to view crime and crime-related activity (e.g. drugs, gangs, and graffiti) as the number one problem facing their communities. When asked, “Considering all of the problems that face your community, which ONE city or community problem do you consider to be the most important,” there was an *increase* (within the margin of error) in the percentage of people who indicated that crime (or crime-related activity) was the most important problem in the community in all four zones.

Lack of jobs (Desert, 18%, and Victor Valley ,12%) and schools (East Valley, 12% and West Valley, 16%) were the second most frequently mentioned community problems.

FEAR OF CRIME AND CRIME-RELATED ISSUES

OVERVIEW: Respondents remain fearful of crime, however within three of the four zones the level of fear has stabilized (i.e., remained within the margin of error) when compared with previous years.

A significant number of respondents in all zones remain “very fearful” or “somewhat fearful” of being the victim of a serious crime. Similarly to last year’s findings, East and West Valley respondents (48% and 39%, respectively) are the most fearful, followed by Victor Valley (33%) and the Desert (24%). But one notable difference exists when this year’s findings are compared with those of the previous year. Within the East Valley, the fear of being the victim of a serious crime rose by 10%.

The vast majority of respondents within each zone, when asked to respond to the question “Have you ever been the victim of a serious crime, or costly crime,” continue to respond “No.” These figures are consistent with the previous years in Victor Valley and the Desert zones, but are at or outside the margin of error in East Valley (69% responding “no” last year vs. 75% this year) and West Valley (68% last year vs. 76% this year).

This year, a new baseline question was introduced in the survey in order to probe the issue of safety a bit more. Specifically, respondents were asked the question: “Is there any area within a mile of your house in which you are afraid to walk at night?” For the Inland Empire as a whole (Riverside and San Bernardino counties combined), an unsettling 38% of respondents state that they live within such areas. East Valley respondents, in particular, indicated a special concern, with 44% indicating such fear. The figures for the other three zones are significantly lower (32% West Valley, 31% Victor Valley, and a surprising 36% in the Desert zone).

In summary, crime and safety issues remain a major and persistent issue/problem within the county.

EVALUATIONS OF SELECTED PRIVATE AND PUBLIC SERVICES

OVERVIEW: In general, Inland Empire respondents continue to show stability in their views regarding the private and public services included in previous Annual Surveys. Police/Sheriff services, shopping, and parks/recreation services are rated quite highly. On the other hand, street/road maintenance, entertainment, and transportation options continue to be problem areas. Evaluations of public schools continue to decline among San Bernardino County respondents.

Each year the Annual Survey includes questions regarding respondents’ evaluations of local services from both the private and public sectors. The data (Table 6) show relative stability

over time in rankings, with only slightly fewer respondents rating services as “excellent” or “good” when compared with the previous survey.

As in previous years, police/sheriff services continue to receive the highest rankings overall, although West Valley respondents rated shopping higher than police/sheriff services. Shopping is rated second highest in all other zones.

Evaluations of public schools have declined since last year in all zones, with an especially sharp drop in West Valley ratings. Last year, when reviewing the public school ratings, we noted that the relatively low percentage of “excellent” or “good” ratings was possibly due to the high number of “don’t know” responses to this question. This year the numbers in the “don’t know” category decreased sharply, yet the percentages of “excellent” or “good” rankings still declined. There are various interpretations/explanations of these findings, which range from poor PR by the schools, to negative reviews in the press, to the voucher issue (which is partially based on the concept that the public system is in disarray), to a possible actual decrease in quality.

As was the case in previous years, the evaluation of street and road maintenance is at or near the bottom of evaluations of all services. Further, there has been a significant decline in ratings, particularly in the West Valley (from 53% last year to this year’s 42%). Clearly this is an issue that has yet to be successfully addressed within the county.

Entertainment and cultural opportunities (museums) are also given low marks, as are local transportation options.

COMMUTING ISSUES

OVERVIEW: Most respondents spend less than 1 hour commuting to and from work each day. But a significant number of San Bernardino County residents report their commuting time to be 2 hours or longer each day (particularly in Victor Valley). These findings are consistent with the past two years' results. The vast majority of San Bernardino County residents commute to work within their own county, although it is noteworthy that over a quarter of West Valley respondents report working in Los Angeles County. San Bernardino County respondents do not support transportation funding strategies that place the financing burden squarely on freeway users and drivers.

The majority of respondents within all four zones report total commuting times (to and from work) of less than 1 hour, with the highest proportions of such less-than-one-hour commuters in the Desert zone (75%) and the lowest number of less-than-one-hour commuters now being reported in Victor Valley (43%). West Valley, which registered the lowest number of less-than-one hour commuters (56%) last year, rose slightly to 59% this year (remaining within the margin of error). Put another way, there are significant differences in total commute time for the four zones: East Valley, 50 minutes; West Valley, 60 minutes; Victor Valley, 80 minutes, and Desert, 41 minutes.

Although a large majority of respondents report commuting a total of less than one hour each day, a significant number of respondents commute for longer times. Indeed, many San Bernardino County respondents commute for over two hours (11 % of East Valley, 18% of West Valley, 28% of Victor Valley, and 9% of Desert respondents). Longer commuting time, of course, takes its toll in terms of personal lifestyle, individual costs for gas and maintenance, implications for energy consumption, and county and state costs for the required road improvements and maintenance.

In this year's questionnaire, the respondents' were asked what they considered to be "an unacceptably long" commute time, and how they would adjust their personal lifestyles when faced with such an unacceptable commute time. Within all zones, the vast majority of residents consider any commute time *over one hour* to be unacceptable. When asked what they would do in such circumstances, the most common responses in all four zones dealt with switching jobs or carpooling, with riding Metrolink a distant third solution.

Although this current study was not targeted at commuters (and therefore does not include sufficient numbers of long-distance commuters to yield sophisticated analysis), the preceding findings nevertheless have some fascinating implications, particularly in light of the fact that the number of long-distance commuters will likely increase over time in the absence of significant economic development within the county. Cross-tabulations suggest that many of the respondents who indicated they would switch jobs are predominantly in the fields of education, the service industry, management/administration, and clerical/kindred workers. These people should be seen as valuable *potential* members of San Bernardino County's labor force who may become *actual* members of the labor force assuming the current economic development efforts within the county produces a sufficient amount of jobs that match their skill level and career interests. In addition, we would argue that for purposes of new business development/attraction, these people should be included in any description of the county's available labor pool. In summary, therefore, economic development efforts may result in a decrease in long-distance commuter traffic (and place more of a burden on local roads). Obviously, however, developing jobs in the Inland Empire to stabilize the commuting population is not cost-free. Further, it must be acknowledged that job-development programs might not produce the requisite number of jobs required to make a dent in reducing long-distance commuters.

Where do San Bernardino residents work? Most respondents work within San Bernardino County. But the West Valley zone continues to register the highest amount of inter-county commuting, with 42% traveling outside the county (the largest group, 27%, to Los Angeles County).

Turning our attention to another issue, we asked respondents whether an increase in gas prices during the past year had caused people to drive less. Countywide, 47% of respondents indicated that they had, indeed, chosen to drive less during the past year due to the increase in gas prices. This trend was not observed uniformly throughout the county, however. The percentages of East Valley and West Valley respondents indicating a decrease in driving (45% and 46%, respectively) were significantly lower than the percentages for Victor Valley (55%) and Desert respondents (54%).

What the above findings suggest is that a significant number of county respondents report driving less due to high gas prices. What specific changes did they make in the way they travel?

The most frequently offered responses involved carpooling/vanpooling and various forms of reducing driving such as combining car trips (“planning better”), reducing driving, and staying home more often. It is a bit discouraging that very few respondents in any zone reported riding the Metrolink or taking the bus. Efforts to divert respondents to alternative forms of transportation will have to be intensified before these figures significantly increase.

In another transportation-related question, respondents were read a list of 5 transportation strategies and asked to indicate which one strategy they felt was the *most* important in terms of improving traffic conditions.

Table 7 emphasizes strongly the overall preference for increasing the capacity of freeways by building and widening freeways. This is consistent with last year’s findings. Clearly the respondents are less optimistic about the strategies involving public transportation, whether rail or bus, as a means of improving traffic problems. Very few zone differences exist, with the notable exception of Desert respondents who are less interested in building and widening freeways, and more interested in the repair and maintenance of existing streets and freeways. Those respondents are also more sympathetic than respondents from the other zones to increasing public bus frequency and routes.

Next, respondents were asked a series of questions dealing with their likelihood to support various methods to pay for transportation projects. The results of these items are summarized in Table 8.

The results in Table 8 suggest that there is substantial support (particularly in the West Valley zone) for continuing the existing sales tax as a method of financing new transportation projects. New development fees seem to have moderate support (other than in the Desert). Respondents in all zones overwhelmingly reject higher gas taxes, and there is only weak support for more toll lanes (particularly in the East Valley and Desert zones). Clearly, policies that place the financing burden squarely on freeway users and drivers tend to elicit strong levels of opposition.

Respondents were also asked how helpful carpool lanes are in managing traffic problems. In previous surveys, carpool lanes received fairly high levels of support, and these findings are reaffirmed in this year’s survey. Countywide, nearly 90% of respondents felt that carpool lanes are “very helpful” or “somewhat helpful.” There are few differences between zones.

MEASURE “I,” METROLINK, AND OTHER ISSUES

OVERVIEW: Very few San Bernardino County respondents were aware of Measure I, and among those few who are aware of the issue in the abstract, very few were able to indicate what it was about. Metrolink awareness is high, and ridership is moderate (especially in East and West Valley). Victor Valley respondents support the proposed “down the hill” service.

San Bernardino County residents were asked a series of items regarding Measure I and Metrolink, with the following results:

An overwhelming majority (76%) of county respondents report being unaware of Measure I, with the lowest level of awareness registered among Victor Valley and Desert respondents. Of the roughly 24% of county respondents who indicated an awareness, only a handful were able to verbalize how these funds are being used.

Awareness of Metrolink is highest in East and West Valley where over 96% of respondents report that they are aware of such service. But awareness diminishes in Victor Valley (89% awareness) and the Desert (70%), as one would expect due to the lack of Metrolink service offered in those areas. The highest percentage of Metrolink use is among West Valley respondents (33%) and East Valley (28%), followed by Victor Valley (17%) and Desert (9%). In East Valley and West Valley, the vast majority of Metrolink riders take the line for entertainment, whereas Victor Valley and Desert respondents are split in their usage between entertainment and business uses. The reader should interpret these results with caution given the small numbers in each zone.

Finally, Victor Valley respondents were asked whether they would consider using a “down the hill” premium commuter bus service which soon will be offered to transport High Desert riders to San Bernardino and Rancho Cucamonga. A majority (56%) answered in the affirmative.

CONFIDENCE IN LOCAL PUBLIC OFFICIALS

OVERVIEW: The majority of zone residents in all four zones are confident that their elected city officials will adopt policies that will benefit the general community. Ratings are slightly higher than last year’s. On the other hand, a significant proportion of people within each of the four zones still expressed either “not much” or “no” confidence in their elected officials.

Respondents were asked: “How much confidence do you have that the elected officials in your city will adopt policies that will benefit the general community?” A majority of respondents in all zones indicated that they are confident that their elected city officials will adopt policies that will benefit the community. On the other hand, a significant proportion of people within each of the four zones expressed either “not much” or “no” confidence in their elected officials: East Valley, 35% (down from 38% last year); West Valley, 24% (down from last year’s 27%); Victor Valley, 38% (down from 40% in 1999); and Desert, 39% (down from 42%).

CONCLUSIONS

In this report we have presented zone-specific findings from the 2000 Inland Empire Annual Survey. The reader is urged to read the general two-county report in which we compare

the results of Riverside County and San Bernardino County respondents. Further, the reader is encouraged to review the full data display (attached) for the complete listing of survey results. Subsequent papers will address issues such as fair treatment by police and sheriffs, immigration, and other issues.
