




PRESIDENT'S WELCOME

California State University, San Bernardino is a preeminent center of intellectual and cultural activity in Inland Southern California. Opened in 1965 and set at the foothills of the beautiful San Bernardino Mountains, the university serves more than 20,000 students each year and graduates about 4,000 students annually.

The university opened the satellite campus Coachella Valley Center in 1986 on the grounds of the College of the Desert in Palm Desert. The first building of a permanent campus opened in Palm Desert in 2002, and expansion continues at what is now known as the Cal State San Bernardino Palm Desert Campus. Today, the campus features four buildings, all built entirely without state funds, with more than \$40 million raised from foundations, municipalities and private gifts.

1. TALK ABOUT COMMUNICATION AND EXPECTATIONS.

It is better to discuss how and when you will communicate early on. This will help to ensure you are on the same page and have understanding from each other about those expectations.

2. HELP MAKE A FINANCIAL PLAN AND DISCUSS EXPECTATIONS WITH YOUR STUDENT.

Develop a tentative budget and be clear about who will pay for what. Teach your student about responsible use of credit and debit cards.

3. VALIDATE THEIR EXPERIENCES.

Your moral and emotional support is crucial. Always remind your student that they are not alone and deserve to be at CSUSB.

4. BE A GUIDE RATHER THAN TRYING TO SOLVE YOUR STUDENT'S PROBLEMS.

Encourage your student to seek out campus resources. Your student will make mistakes and will experience challenges throughout college. CSUSB offers many resources and services to students. If they are having trouble with something or want to be more involved, we have an office on campus that can support them.

5. DISCUSS ACADEMIC GOALS AND EXPECTATIONS AHEAD OF TIME.

Encourage them to take advantage of academic support services early on! Don't wait until things get bad; be proactive.

6. ENCOURAGE THEM TO GET INVOLVED.

Getting involved on campus is a great way to make connections, find mentors and become a more balanced student. Statistics show that engaged students are more likely to have higher GPAs and graduate on time.

7. ENCOURAGE YOUR STUDENT TO GO SEE THEIR PROFESSORS.

Professors are great resources, setting aside time to meet with students for students to ask questions and seek feedback. They will also be a great reference for when your student is applying to internships, jobs or possibly graduate school.

8. DON'T PRESSURE THEM TO BE AT HOME ALL THE TIME.

Attempt to eliminate unnecessary distractions that can hinder your student's transition into college life and culture.

9. HELP YOUR STUDENT DEVELOP HIS OR HER PASSION.

Recognize the value of academic exploration. Encourage exploring majors or new areas of academic interest.

10. PROTECT THE LAST MONTH OF THE SEMESTER.

A large percentage of your student's grades are awarded in the final assignments of the semester. Don't distract them with other activities but allow them to spend more time focusing on their academics.

ACADEMIC ADVISING

The first year in college is the foundation of a student's success in college, and for their lives after college. WHERE DOES MY STUDENT GO FOR ADVISING?


Advising is based on your student's declared major and is unique to each major.

- Faculty Advisors Professors! This provides students the opportunity to build a relationship with someone who can serve as a mentor and guide them in their career path.
- **Professional Advisors** Staff who provide assistance with general advising, majors and academic policy related questions.
- Peer Advisors Students who are usually upperclassmen who have already mastered the art of navigating college life.

Faculty, staff and peer advisors at the university are available to assist your student by providing academic advisement during their office hours or by appointment.

ACADEMIC RESOURCES

At CSUSB, we are committed to assisting students in earning a degree in the shortest time possible. Students can graduate in four years with clear goals, careful planning, academic support and a commitment to work diligently. To support students in this endeavor, the university pledges to provide a quality educational experience with an academic schedule and degree requirements that will suit a full-time enrollment and study.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE?

Entering first-year students who:

- Have a declared major (and concentration if applicable)
- Are willing to earn 30 semester units or more per academic year (degree applicable)
 Maintain a 3.0 overall grade point average

CSUSB is dedicated to provide a wide variety of academic resources to aid in your student's success.

JOHN M. PFAU LIBRARY

The library gives your student access to the collection of library books at CSUSB and other libraries at CSU colleges (hard copy and electronic). In addition, we offer a variety of services, such as the ability to borrow equipment (laptop, iPad, camera, lighting equipment, etc.); access to a computer lab to print, scan and copy; and to obtain free advice from experts on their assignments. OFFICE OF STUDENT RESEARCH

The Office of Student Research (OSR) offers students the opportunity to gain hands-on experience in a broad range of research and creative activities. The OSR offers a paid summer research program, a student-run journal, and a number of avenues for financial assistance designed to support student researchers. SAMPLE STUDENT WEEK

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

To be a successful college student, your student will need to reevaluate how they spend their time. College not only offers a different environment, it requires that students reflect on and adapt their time management skills. There are **168 hours per week** for students to mange academics, personal life and a work schedule. Here is an example of how those hours are spent each week if a student is enrolled in 10 units:



For your student to be on track to graduate in four years, they will need to take **15 units** (equivalent to **15 hours**) per semester.



The rule of thumb is that for each hour spent in class during the week, **at least 2 hours** should be spent outside of the class to keep up with readings, group projects, papers and other homework. This can include going to Supplemental Instruction sessions, the Tutoring Center or the Writing Center to get assistance on assignments, preparing for a test or receiving feedback on their papers. The first year is a great time to adapt or consider new methods of one's study habits.



It is critical that sleep is incorporated into our daily life. It is recommended that a person should get **7-8 hours of sleep per day**. This will help your body and brain feel rested, will support a healthy immune system and will help one be more alert throughout the day.



Working on or off campus is not only a great way to earn some additional income, but a chance to gain professional skills, develop relationships and be more connected to the campus. Research also shows that students who work **20 hours or less** have higher GPAs!



We all need time for personal hours, this includes setting time aside for meals, structured activities (gym, church, etc.), commuting to and from school, family obligations, socializing with friends, and campus involvement. However, this will often be the most flexible and where one should prioritize their activities to fit between **47-54 hours**.

COYOTE ONECARD

The TSC is the issuer of Coyote OneCard, the official CSUSB identification card. The Coyote OneCard provides many benefits:

PAYING FOR COLLEGE

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Financial aid programs provide support for students to help meet the costs of obtaining a college education. Funding for such programs is provided by the federal and state governments, the individual colleges and universities, and a variety of other public and private sources. Financial aid is available to students and families of all income levels and comes in several different forms:

- **Grants** Federal or state gift assistance with no obligation for work or repayment
- **Loans** Providing funds now, but with a future repayment obligation
- **Scholarships** Gift assistance with no obligation for work or repayment
- Work-Study Part-time work while attending CSUSB

Everyone must use the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to apply for aid. When your student is ready to apply, fill out the online www.fafsa.ed.gov.

STUDENT FINANCIAL SERVICES

The Student Financial Services Office provides a variety of financial services to effectively and efficiently assist students with managing their student account. Services the Student Financial Services office provides include:

- Collection of student fees
- Tuition payment plans
- Emergency loans
- Book vouchers
- Direct deposit
- Refunds

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Students may grant the Student Financial Services Office permission to release information about their student financial account to a third party (including parents, step-parents, spouse, etc.) by submitting a Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) Authorization form.

Completed and signed FERPA Authorization Forms must be scanned and emailed to sfs@csusb.edu using the student's CSUSB issued email account. The email must also include a scanned copy of the student's and third party individual's government-issued ID.

For questions regarding their account, students should contact our office at (909) 537-5162 or sfs.csusb.edu.

Under FERPA, parents have certain rights with respect to their student's educational records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond the high school level. Parents are no longer guaranteed access to academic, financial or medical records of their student.

GENERAL INFORMATION

FERPA provides that eligible students will inspect and review their educational records and also provides and protects the rights of a student to privacy by limiting access to the educational record without expressed written consent.

Students may control access to their records by completing forms through the Office of the Registrar. It is important to remember that inspection of student records by University officials for educational purposes is permitted. The following guidelines are provided for release of information under the provisions of this law:

Releasable Information, also known as Directory Information, is general information that may be released to anyone without the consent of the student, unless the student indicates otherwise.

This information includes:

- Student Name
- Local and Permanent Address
- Local Telephone Number
- Email address
- Degrees and Awards Received
- Major

Non-releasable Information, or Personally Identifiable Information, is any information not



defined as directory information and may not be released without the consent of the student. This also includes any directory information that the student has indicated will not be released.



Fraternities and Sororities

National Student Exchange (NSE)

NSE offers study opportunities at over 200 diverse university setting across the U.S., U.S. territories and Canada and provides access to a wide array of courses and programs. Student Club and Organizations

SANTOS MANUEL STUDENT UNION (SMSU)

SERVICES FOR STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES (SSD)

Services to Students with Disabilities (SSD) provides academic support services to students with disabilities so that they can achieve academic success and self-efficacy. SSD provides a wide range of accommodations (i.e., notetaking, cart service, and more) that are

SAIL's mission is to increase the college retention and graduation rates of undergraduate first-generation, lowincome and college students with disabilities. The program supports its students using a variety of academic support, advising and counseling services.

STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

CSUSB provides a limited number of part-time on campus positions for eligible CSUSB students providing students the ability to earn money as well as develop new skills to ensure professional success.

STUDY ABROAD

CSUSB offers over 20 countries to its students to participate in the Study Abroad program. Study Abroad focuses on providing students with the necessary information to advise them in selecting the best study abroad program that will complement their educational and career goals. Through Study Abroad, students learn about other cultures, history, and language; build their resume and expand career opportunities; build their professional network and appreciate diversity of the different cultures worldwide all while earning academic credit.

Our medical services include limited primary and psychiatric care, immunizations, nursing care and health education. Our health center is conveniently equipped with a pharmacy and laboratory.

All enrolled students at CSUSB pay a Student Health Fee and are eligible for health services at the Student Health Center. We have a full-time staff Monday through Friday to care for your student's needs. First aid is always available during clinic hours to anyone on campus. Care beyond our scope may be referred out.

Please note: the CSU Immunization Requirements and Screenings have been updated. All students must submit proof of the required immunizations before registering for their second semester.

Your student's myCoyote account will be updated and a hold will be placed if their proof of immunizations has not been received by the Student Health Center. COUNSELING & PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES (CAPS)

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Counseling services are available at CSUSB to ensure the well-being of our students. The center's professional staff are highly trained and experienced in helping students successfully cope with a variety of concerns common during the college experience. Services help enhance students' skills and attitudes in adapting to college life, handling challenges, relating to new and different people, and making their Coyote experience satisfying and productive.

Our services provided include, individual, couples and group therapy; crisis counseling; Health and Wellness workshops and community referrals.

All enrolled student who pay a Student Health Fee are eligible for health and counseling services through CAPS. The counseling staff is available Monday through Friday with extended hours Monday through Thursday. CAMPUS ASSESSMENT, RESPONSE AND EDUCATION TEAM (CARE TEAM)

The Campus Assessment, Response and Education (CARE) Team's mission is to support the safety and well-being of the university community and to maintain a productive learning and working environment through incident assessment, campus education, and intervention. The CARE Team is a multidisciplinary group of professional staff members that come together to provide support and resources to students. The Team receives, assesses, responds to, and monitors behavior on campus that may be disruptive, concerning, or threatening.

The CARE Team should be contacted about individuals who may be exhibiting behaviors of concern in relation to their personal, physical or emotional wellbeing, or who are behaving in a manner that is intimidating, disruptive, aggressive or violent. Once a referral is made, the CARE Team will review all available information and make a determination regarding appropriate outcomes, and will follow up with the reporting and responding parties.
