#### ADDS REQUIRING PERMITS

### **Classes Needing Department Approval:**

When the registration system informs you that department consent or pre-requisites are required for a class you are trying to register for, please see the department of the class for permission to register for it. Departments will first check that you meet the requirements for the class before placing the permit onto your records. This may include student level, pre-requisites, GPA, or classification.

#### Class is open

After department permission has been granted, use the on-line (myCoyote) registration system to add the course by the designated "Last Day to Add Via myCoyote" date for each session (see below). Footnotes for requirements such as "dept permission" are noted for each class, following the section number, in the list of available classes, in the class schedule. Explanation of these footnotes follow.

# Last Day to Add Via myCoyote

Session 6W1: June 23, 2020 Pre-payment of any additional tuition fees is required.

### Class is closed (All sessions)

After obtaining department approval, students who have compelling reasons for being admitted to a closed class must also obtain **<u>permission</u>** from the instructor AND department chair of the class <u>once classes begin</u>. To Add: Refer to the information listed below under "Closed Classes".

#### **Closed Classes**

When a class reaches its maximum enrollment it is then considered "closed" to other registrants. The signatures of the instructor and department chair for the course section must be obtained as permission to register over the max enrollment. <u>Once classes begin</u>, follow these steps: (1) Complete the ADD/DROP Form; (2) obtain the signatures of the instructor and department chair; and (3) submit the ADD/DROP form to the registration assistant in UH-171 with your student I.D. CLOSED COURSES CANNOT BE ADDED OVER myCoyote.

**NOTE!** <u>It is the student's responsibility to add a class to</u> <u>their class schedule by officially **registering** for that class with an Add Slip containing the appropriate signatures to the Office of the Registrar.</u>

# REGISTRATION

<u>BE ADVISED</u>: Instructors cannot "add" a class to your class schedule by adding your name to the class roster! Official registration for a class must be initiated by the student, by following the procedures listed above.

# Last Day to Add by Permission or by Permit (Census):

Session 6W1: June 30, 2020

#### By permission with Add Slips:

Bring approved Add Slips to the Office of the Registrar in UH-171. Add Slips will **not be honored after the Census date for each session**. However, courses requiring "department consent" or "prerequisites not met" will require that you receive a permit from the department of the class prior to being registered for the class.

#### By department issued permit:

Contact the department of the class for a permit to register. Once the permit has been placed, you will be able to register for the class over myCoyote through Census, (per Session). Registration for a permitted class **will not be allowed over myCoyote after Census for each session**.

# **DROPPING CLASSES**

During Registration Appointments, Open Enrollment, Late Registration & Late Drop Periods:

No record will be made of enrollment in courses that are dropped by the last day to drop (Census) for each session. To drop a course, use the on-line registration system (myCoyote) by the designated Census date for each of the sessions (see below).

Drops will not be possible after the designated Census deadline for each session except for serious and compelling reasons. You will be required to provide documentation in order for the request to be considered. Furthermore, drops after the deadline will require the signatures of the class instructor, department chair and the College Dean of the student's major.

It is the student's responsibility to verify their class schedule prior to the Census deadline as they will receive a grade for every course in which they are shown to be officially registered. \*It is also the student's responsibility to withdraw (drop) by the Census deadline from any class(es) which they do not plan to attend and complete. Although an instructor <u>may</u> initiate to drop a student from a class based on the Administrative Drop Policy, students should not **assume** that the instructor would drop anyone from a class. (Refer to the <u>Academic Course</u> <u>Catalog</u> for information regarding the Administrative Drop Policy). Summer 2020

# CANCELLATION OF REGISTRATION OR WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

CSU POLICY: Beginning Fall quarter 2009, undergraduate students may not exceed 28 quarter units of withdrawals (grade of "W"). Withdrawals completed prior to Fall 2009 are not included in that total. This limit applies only to courses taken at CSUSB, including courses taken through Open University, the College of Extended Learning and special session. The policy will be available at <u>www-ugs.</u> <u>csusb.edu/advising.</u>

Students who find it necessary to cancel their registration or to \*withdraw from <u>all classes</u> after enrolling for any academic term are required to follow the University's official withdrawal procedures. <u>Failure to follow formal</u> <u>University procedures may result in an obligation to</u> <u>pay tuition fees as well as the assignment of failing</u> <u>grades in all courses and the need to petition for readmission before being permitted to enroll in another</u> <u>academic term</u>. Information on canceling registration and withdrawal procedures are available from the Office of the Registrar, UH 171 and/or phone 909-537-5200.

Students who receive financial aid funds must consult with the Financial Aid Office prior to withdrawing from the University regarding any required return or repayment of grant or loan assistance received for that academic term or payment period. If a recipient of student financial aid withdraws during an academic term or a payment period, the amount of grant or loan assistance received may be subject to return and/or repayment provisions.

# WITHDRAWAL FROM THE UNIVERSITY

 If a student drops a class or withdraws from the University by the last day to drop (Census), for the designated session, no record will be made of enrollment in the course(s). (See "Refund of Tuition Fees" to determine eligibility for a refund.)

- 2. A drop or withdrawal will not be permitted after the last day to drop (Census), for the designated session, except in cases involving accident or illness (physical or mental), serious personal or family problems, military transfer, or substantial change in employment during the term. (See "Refund of Tuition Fees" to determine eligibility for a refund.)
- A GRADE OF "W" WILL BE ASSIGNED for approved drops and withdrawals <u>occurring after the</u> <u>Census date for the designated session</u>. If a student drops a class or withdraws from the University by the last day to drop, no record will be made of enrollment in the course(s). (See "Refund of Tuition Fees" pages to determine eligibility for a refund.)
- 4. A GRADE OF "WU" WILL BE ASSIGNED (Withdrawal Unauthorized) if and when a student fails to officially drop from a class or classes. <u>This grade is</u> equivalent to an "F" and will retain fees.

# WITHDRAWAL PROCEDURES

# By last day to drop, for each session (Census):

Record of enrollment will not be made, nor grade of W will be issued, if a student withdraws from all classes by the Census date for the designated session. You may withdraw from all classes over myCoyote by the Census deadline. Questions regarding this process should be addressed to the Office of the Registrar in UH-171 or by calling 909-537-5200.

# After (Census) (for the designated session):

Report to the office of <u>your major</u>. Undeclared students will need to report to the Office of Advising and Academic Services in UH-380 and unclassified graduate students report to the Office Graduate Studies in CH-123. Supporting documentation is required and must be submitted with the Petition to Drop After Census form. *Picture ID is required*.

# Deadline to Withdraw After Census: Session 6W1: July 16, 2020

#### **RETROACTIVE WITHDRAWALS**

Requests for withdrawal from a course(s) following the end of the term (retroactive withdrawal) will be considered, with required documentation, only for:

# 1. ACCIDENT OR ILLNESS

(Physical or mental) DOCUMENTATION: Police Report, note from physician

- SERIOUS PERSONAL or FAMILY PROBLEMS DOCUMENTATION: Licensed clergyman or therapist, needs to be a Professional
- 3. **MILITARY TRANSFER** DOCUMENTATION: Transfer papers, or military orders

Note: Rental agreements or change of address are not sufficient for documentation of retroactive withdrawal. Transfer out of the area still requires students to drop courses before the refund deadline date designated for each session. Documentation is required. In addition, extenuating circumstances **MUST** be shown to have prevented withdrawal before the refund deadline date. Partial retroactive withdrawal from courses is not permissible for any reason. All courses must be withdrawn and will be noted with a "W" on the official transcript. **Lack of awareness of the withdrawal procedure is not an extenuating circumstance**. Requests must be made in writing to the Director of Advising and Academic Services, UH-380.

# Important Information Regarding Your Summer Financial Aid



Summer aid will be based on remaining (unused) financial aid eligibility from the 2019-2020 academic year. Additional aid includes: Summer Assistance Grant (**SAG**) to assist with summer fees for students including students admitted to CSUSB under AB540 also known as California Dream students; a Summer Graduate Initiative Grant (**GIG**) is available to seniors planning to graduate by end of Summer 2020 (not based on financial need). Other types of additional summer financial aid include but are not limited to Pell Grant, Subsidized and Unsubsidized loans, Grad PLUS loans, Parent PLUS loans, some fee waivers, TEACH Grant, and scholarships. # ELIGIBILITY

Summer awards are based on initial enrollment in the total number of units from all summer sessions, and:

- Have a 2019-2020 FAFSA or DREAM Act Application on file by April 20, 2020
- Have remaining (unused) eligibility from the 2019-2020 academic year (i.e. Fall, Winter and Spring).
- Be regularly admitted to CSUSB in an eligible degree program during the summer term.
- Pell Grant and Direct Loans require at least half time enrollment: Undergraduate and Classified Credential students: must be enrolled at least six (6) units; for Graduate students: must be enrolled at least four (4) units of graduate level course work.

# Dropping could have an effect on your financial aid!

- A repayment calculation will be made using the appropriate federal Return of Title IV policy. This calculation will determine what percentage of aid received, if any, you are eligible to receive/retain and how much, if any, you may have to return.
- If you drop all classes prior to the first day of the session, you will owe 100% of all aid disbursed to you.
- If you received a loan and withdraw, you start using your grace period. Students receiving a loan must be enrolled in a minimum of six (6) units for their loan.
- Once your repayment has been calculated, you will have 45 days to repay the funds. You cannot repay these funds with future financial aid. You must repay the amount due prior to receiving future federal financial aid again.
- Dropping courses may affect your Satisfactory Academic Progress and future financial aid eligibility. You

The CSUSB Police Department, established Jan. 23, 1974, is a state law enforcement agency which employs 18 sworn police officers and an active support staff for 24-hour protection of the campus community. # PARKING FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

# Below are some of the most frequently asked questions regarding parking regulations at CSUSB. If your specific question is not addressed, please call Parking Services at (909) 537-5912.

Questions	Answers
Where can I purchase a parking per- mit?	Parking permits are only available for purchase online at <u>http://park-ing.csusb.edu/</u> . All General Parking Permits will be mailed out while all Resident Permits will have to be picked up. A temporary printable permit will be issued at the time of your purchase.
When are permits required?	Permits are required for parking on campus at all times – 24 hours a day 7 days a week.
Is there a grace period when parking permits are not required?	<b>No</b> . Permits are required for parking on campus at all times - 24 hours a day 7 days a week.
I did not receive a temporary parking permit after buying my permit online.	You should have received an email receipt from <u>onlinepermits@</u> <u>csusb.edu</u> in your email account. (Also check your spam folder) This email will serve as your temporary permit until the expiration date listed. If you did not receive the email please contact Parking Ser- vices at parking@csusb.edu.
I paid for my parking permit online and it has not arrived in the mail. What should I do?	Please ensure your mailing address on <i>MyCoyote</i> is correct also check your spam folder. If you still have not received your physical permit by the 10th day, please contact the Parking Services Office at (909) 537- 5912.
If I paid for a parking permit, I can park wherever I want, right?	<b>No</b> . Parking permits allow students to park in general student spaces ONLY. They do not guarantee the availability of a parking space. The inability to locate a parking space is not a valid justification for parking illegally. Also, your parking permit must be properly displayed in plain, full view, with numbers and dates clearly visible.
I only have a couple of classes a week; can I just pay for a daily parking permit?	Yes. Daily Permits can be purchased at either of our Information Centers on University Parkway or Coyote Drive or at any of the 16 parking permit dispensers located throughout the campus. <u>https://www.csusb.edu/sites/default/files/CSUSBcampusmapcolor.</u> <u>pdf</u> .
I ride a motorcycle. Do I have to pay to park?	Parking permits are not issued for motorcycles, but you do need to pay for a motorcycle parking pass. After paying the parking fee, sub- mit a "Request to Not Display a Parking Permit" online form. <u>http://parking.csusb.edu/index.html.</u>
I have a disabled placard. Do I have to purchase a parking permit?	<b>Yes</b> . In addition to having a valid placard properly displayed or a license plate that signifies that you are disabled, your vehicle must display a current CSUSB parking permit. Vehicles displaying both may park in any general spaces in any lot as well as handicap stalls

<i>If I lose my parking permit, can I get another one free of charge?</i>	<b>No.</b> Parking permits are personal property, just like books, calculators, and jewelry. To replace a lost permit you will have to purchase another one. As for stolen permits, if you are the victim of a theft you should report the circumstances to Campus Police. Depending on the circumstances of the crime a stolen permit may be replaced to you free of charge.
Does parking services offer help with battery jumps or with unlocking ve- hicles?	<b>Yes.</b> Please contact the University Police at (909) 537-5165.
I received a parking citation. Now what do I do?	If you believe the citation was issued in error, you may contest the citation. Follow the "Review" instructions on the back of the citation. You have twenty-one (21) calendar days from the date of the citation to submit an Administrative for Review Request.
What happens if a citation is not paid?	If a citation is not paid or appealed within twenty-one (21) calendar days from the date of issue, late fees will be applied. A hold may be place on your student account, and a vehicle registration hold will be placed with the Department of Motor Vehicles.
How do I pay a citation online?	Citations may be paid online at Parking Services website
I am visiting campus for the first time, do I have to pay?	Yes, everyone must pay to park in the university-owned parking facilities.
Where do I put my permit on my car?	Permits shall be displayed in the lower left corner of the front wind- shield.
I've appealed a citation and haven't received a decision yet, but my citation fine is due today. What should I do?	Once you submit an appeal through our online appeals system, the original deadline no longer stands. There is no need to pay the citation while you wait the results of your appeal. Should your appeal be denied, you will be given a new due date for payment of your citation.
I don't have a printer at home to print my temporary if I leave a note on my vehicle explaining why I am parked, will I still receive a parking citation?	Yes, notes left on vehicle windshields are not justification to park il- legally. Enforcement officers will disregard notes left on vehicles.
l parked my vehicle reversed in a di- agonal stall and received a fine.	Vehicles may not be parked backwards in a diagonal space. There are signs posted stating diagonal parking is not allowed and it is also stated on the campus parking regulations. <u>Campus Parking Regula-tions</u>
What if I have more than one car, I am driving a rental or my car is in the shop?	If you have a valid CSUSB parking permit you can simply remove the permit and place the permit onto the vehicle you will be driving.

# **Grievance Policy Information**

Questions regarding the Student Academic Grievance Procedure are available from <u>Advising and Academic</u> <u>website</u>.

A student may appeal a final course grade or a grade on a Comprehensive Examination or a project (e.g. art exhibition) or thesis required for graduation. An appeal may be initiated on the basis of:

- Clerical error
- Capricious or prejudicial evaluation
- Inconsistent or inequitably applied standards for evaluation

Students may also appeal other types of academic decisions. These include, but are not limited to:

- Denial of Admission to or Dismissal from a course, major or program.
- Placement on Academic Probation
- Suspension or Dismissal from the University

A simple allegation or unsubstantiated assertion is an insufficient basis for lodging a formal complaint. Students must support their allegations with evidence compelling enough to give the Academic Grievance Committee reason to hold a formal hearing.

#### Commencement

#### **Change of Major**

In order to declare or change a major, add a concentration, track, option, or plan, students must submit a Change of Major request with the <u>Office of the Registrar</u>. Students will be held to the major requirements for the catalog year in which the Change of Major is submitted. A processing fee of \$6.00 will be charged for each change, addition or deletion. An updated PAWS\* reflecting the change, addition or deletion will be available to view and print approximately two weeks after the request has been submitted and approved.

\*If you are a new student and have not yet received notification (via campus e-mail) of your completed PAWS, note that you will not be able to view an up-dated PAWS reflecting the major/minor changes (or additions) until your PAWS is completed.

#### **Concurrent Enrollment**

Once a student has matriculated at this University, transfer courses will only be accepted for credit if the courses have prior approval on the Concurrent Enrollment for Equivalent Transfer Course(s) form.

Students attending CSUSB on I-20 Visas are not eligible for concurrent enrollment at community colleges. They may, however, participate in the CSU Intrasystem Concurrent Enrollment Program or the UCR/CSUSB Cross Registration Program but must be concurrently enrolled in (and complete) at least 12 units at CSUSB and may only en-roll in upper-division courses that are not offered at CSUSB. 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# **CSU Intrasystem Program**

# **Graduation Requirement Check**

Students must request a graduation requirement check with the <u>Office of the Registrar</u> prior to the end of the term of their expected graduation. To avoid late fees, the graduation check should be filed by the established deadlines. Note that the <u>deadline is the first business day of the</u> <u>months listed below</u>. To be eligible to file a grad check, undergraduate students must have completed 135 quarter units towards their degree. This may include current work in progress. Graduate students must be advanced to candidacy.

The fee for filing the Grad Check is \$25 per major, minor, concentration, option, plan, specialty or track. If the Grad Check is filed after the deadline, an additional \$20 late fee, per major, minor, concentration, option, plan, specialty or track will be charged. The \$50 Commencement fee is due at the time the Grad Check is requested. Students who do not complete the requirements in the term for which the Grad Check was filed, must re-file and pay a \$20 re-file fee for a second Grad Check, per major, minor, concentration, option, plan, specialty or track. If the refiled Grad Check is filed after the deadline date, an additional \$20 late fee, per major, minor, concentration, option, plan, specialty or track, will be charged. The \$50 commencement fee is not accessed to re-file a Grad Check under the same career (or academic program). Access to registration for subsequent terms will not be allowed until the Grad Check has been refiled. Once the Grad Check is completed, students will receive an email notification confirming completion and that the grad check is available to view from the myCoyote Student Center.

# **Transcript Requests**

Fees for transcripts are payable in advance. All transcripts will be complete as of the date of issuance showing all work attempted at the California State University, San Bernardino. Transcripts are normally mailed within two to four business days after receipt of request. However, if the request specifies inclusion of grades just earned or verification of a degree just awarded, two or three weeks must be allowed beyond the end of the quarter for a transcript to be issued. No transcript will be released if there is a transcript service indicator hold. The student is responsible for resolving the hold prior to submitting a transcript request. Otherwise, the transcript request will be cancelled. # **CSU Immunization Requirements**

Immunization are required as conditions of enrollment in the CSU.

Entering CSU students are required to present proof of the following immunizations to the CSU campuses they will be attending before the beginning of their first term of enrollment: A) Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR), B. Varicella (Chickenpox), C) Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis (Tdap), D) Meningococcal conjugate (Serogroups A, C, Y, W-135), and E) Screening and Risk Assessment for Tuberculosis (TB).

In addition to these required vaccines and screenings, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and California Department of Public Health (CDPH) strongly recommends several additional vaccinations. For more information regarding vaccinations, screening requirements, recommendations, and immunization schedules please visit the <u>Student Health Center's website</u>.

Campus implementation of the required immunizations and screenings shall include provisions for exemptions based on medical considerations only.

#### **Course Numbering System**

- 1-99 Non degree-applicable credit.
- 100-299 Lower-division courses designed primarily for freshmen and sophomores. Graduate credit is not allowed.
- 300-599 Upper-division courses of junior and senior level; graduate credit may be awarded if course is accepted in a specific graduate program.
- 600-699 Courses for postbaccalaureate and graduate students only. May not be taken by undergraduates.
- 700-799 Courses for doctoral candidates only.
- 990-999 Special comprehensive exams, projects, units not awarded.

#### Administrative Drop

Faculty members may initiate an administrative drop of a student in their courses based on any one of the following criteria.

**Lack of attendance:** Students who fail to attend two consecutive class meetings during the first three weeks of the term without contacting the faculty member or making special arrangements may be dropped.

<u>Prerequisites not met</u>: Students who are unable to show completion of required courses or who do not have the background needed to succeed in the course may be dropped.

**Not admitted to the major:** Students who have not been formally admitted to certain major programs will be dropped from courses that are open only to declared majors in that program. To remain in such classes, permission of the instructor may be required.

It is important to note that neither undergraduate students nor graduate students should assume that the instructor will process an administrative drop. Students are responsible for making sure that they are enrolled only in those classes they intend to complete.

### **Attending Classes**

- 1. No student may attend classes until his/her registration has been completed.
- 2. Regular attendance is expected of all students enrolled at the University. The instructor of each class sets specific standards expected of students.
- 3. A student absent from class is responsible for arranging to make up missed class work and assignments if the instructor of the class allows for such make-up work to be done.

#### Auditing Courses

Enrollment in any course as an auditor shall be permitted only after students otherwise eligible to enroll in the course on a credit basis have had an opportunity to do so and only upon consent of the instructor. Auditors are subject to the same fee structure as credit students, and regular class attendance is expected.

Credit for courses audited will not subsequently be granted on the basis of the audit. Transcripts are not issued for audited courses. Once enrolled as an auditor, a student may not change to credit status unless such a change is requested within the first week of class and is approved by the instructor. Students registered for credit may change their status from that of an enrolled student to that of an auditor with the approval of the instructor concerned and within the first three weeks of class. Forms for such changes may be obtained at the Office of the Registrar in University Hall 171

# **Course Overload Permits**

In order to exceed the maximum units allowed per quarter, a student may request permission to overload units (Course Overload Permit) with the College Dean of the students' major. In order to be considered, students must be eligible by having both a grade average for the previous term of 3.0 or better and an overall grade-point average of 3.0 or better.

Approved Course Overload Permits will be accepted at the Office of the Registrar <u>beginning on the first day of late</u> <u>registration</u>, for processing. Additional registration and tuition fees must be paid and **HOLDS** must be cleared PRI-OR TO SUBMITTING A REQUEST TO OVERLOAD FOR PROCESSING. To enroll with an overload, follow these steps:

1. Obtain the approvals (signature) of the instructor and department Chair (of the course) for the course that will constitute the overload if the class is closed. If the class is open for enrollment, and prior to classes starting, proceed to step two (2).

Closed courses **without** an instructor's and Chair's approval will not be added to your class schedule. Courses are subject to the regulations set by the CSUSB Add Policy. Please refer to the class schedule for procedures and deadlines under "ADDS REQUIR-ING PERMITS".

2. Obtain the authorized signature of approval from the College Dean.

**Declared** undergraduates see the dean of the college of your major for approval.

<u>Undeclared</u> undergraduates see the Dean of Undergraduate Studies for approval.

**<u>Classified</u>** graduates and post-baccalaureates see their graduate coordinator for approval.

<u>Unclassified</u> graduates and post-baccalaureates see the Dean of Graduate Studies for approval.

3. **Once approved,** take the overload permit card, and picture I.D. to either the Office of the Registrar (UH-171) or the office of the college dean of your major for processing, once late registration begins.

# **Credit By Examination**

A matriculated student may petition to receive course credit by examination. In this manner a student who already possesses the skills or knowledge of the ideas and concepts of a course can accelerate progress through the University. The following steps must be taken:

- 1. Student must register for the examination in the office of the college or department concerned before the first day of classes of the quarter in which the course is offered.
- Student must complete the examination within the first two weeks of the quarter. (NOTE: Students may NOT enroll in a course they plan to challenge. If the challenge is unsuccessful, the student may add the course subject to the regulation for adding a class).
- 3. Credit by examination may only be taken by students currently enrolled as regular matriculated students in courses other than the one to be challenged.

Consult the current <u>Academic Course Catalog</u> for regulations governing credit by examination for undergraduates, post-baccalaureate students and graduate students.

**Immunizations** Immunizations are required of students as conditions of enrollment in the CSU.

Entering CSU students are required to present proof of the following immunizations to the CSU campuses they will be attending before the beginning of their first term of enrollment: A) Measles, Mumps, and Rubella (MMR), B) Varicella (Chickenpox), C) Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis (Tdap), D) Meningococcal conjugate (Sero- groups A, C, Y, W-135), and E) Screening and Risk Assessment for Tuberculosis (TB).

In addition to these required vaccines and screenings, the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and California Department of Public Health (CDPH) strongly recommends several additional vaccinations. # Gateway to University courses for non-admitted students

Open University makes it possible for you to take degree-applicable CSUSB courses, on a space-available basis without being formally admitted to the University. Some classes may require you to meet the necessary prerequisites, if any, before enrolling.

# Open University is a program designed for those who:

want to examine a particular field before seeking admission to the university and enrolling in a degree program;

- want to update professional skills;
- missed the deadline for admission to CSUSB;
- have stopped attending CSUSB and wish to reenter;
- want to improve their GPA to reenter an academic program;
- wish to take selected CSUSB courses that will transfer to another university; or
- want to take a course for the enjoyment of learning.

The Open University program can help you update professional skills, prepare for a career change, enrich your personal development or work toward a degree. Many of the regular courses are held in the late afternoon and evenings, which provide opportunities for working adults.

For a listing of courses, consult the CSUSB Schedule of Classes.

\*Important Student Fee Information: The College of Extended and Global Education makes every effort to keep student costs to a minimum.
