Plan I is an approved single subject teaching credential preparation program in art designed for those seeking to teach middle or high school art. Plan II is for students with a strong professional interest in art and who may wish to pursue graduate studies in the studio areas of Ceramics, Glass, Painting, Photography, Printmaking, Sculpture or Woodworking and Furniture Design. Plan III is for students with a professional interest in art history or museum work and who may wish to pursue graduate studies. Plan IV prepares students for a career in graphic design with an emphasis in electronic and print media while Plan V is for those with a career interest in graphic design, marketing, public relations and business communications.
