CSCE Internship Program	\$0	During the 2019-2020 academic year, the CSCE supported internships for three English students (two graduate students and one undergraduate). Interns assisted with the transcription of interviews and the coding of data for a new research project that examines the literacy practices of queer and trans incarcerated people. Preliminary results from this research were presented at the Conference on Community Writing in October 2019 and the Conference on College Composition and Communication in March 2020 (online). This work advances goal B, to facilitate and coordinate research.
Inside Out college-in-prison program development	\$0	Since attending the Inside Out Instructor Training Institute, Dr. Cavallaro has partnered with Pitzer College to work on offering an Inside Out course at the California Rehabilitation Center. Since beginning this partnership, Dr. Cavallaro has secured permission to offer an Inside Out course at the CRC from the prison administration and has worked with CSUSB offices (admissions, financial aid, Office of the Provost, etc.) to figure out the logistics in order to enroll incarcerated students. With the guidance of Monir Ahmed, we will be enrolling incarcerated students who already qualify for a tuition waiver. The next step is to

		 coordinate enrollment logistics with the College of Extended and Global Education. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, conversations were put on hold temporarily regarding this project since most in-prison programming was suspended. This advances goal A, to provide in-prison programs.
Prison Education Project	\$1200 (from OCE Grant)	In fall 2019, Dr. Cavallaro and Dr. Ovalle Perez taught a course at the California Rehabilitation Center with three English student interns in partnership with the Prison Education Project, a program that coordinates educational workshops in local state prisons. Spring 2020's course at the CRC met only once before being canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Fall 2020's course (with two English student interns) will run via Zoom at the Prototypes Rehabilitation Facility. The OCE grant paid for books, notebooks, pens, and photocopies for incarcerated students. This advances goal A, to provide in-prison programs.
Speaker (Ernst Fenelon Jr., Senior Programs Coordinator, Prison Education Project)	\$200 (from OCE Grant)	In order to promote our partnership with the Prison Education Project, Ernst Fenelon Jr. gave a talk on his experiences as a formerly incarcerated person and on the transformative potential of prison education (November 2019). The OCE grant paid for Fenelon's honorarium. This advances goal A, to provide in-prison programs.

CCCC Prison Literacies Workshop	\$0	Dr. Cavallaro co-facilitated the workshop "Where Inside and Outside Meet: Naming our Commonplaces in Prison-Based Teaching and Research" for the Teaching in Prison: Pedagogy, Research and Literacies Collective at the Conference on College Composition and Communication in Milwaukee, WI (March 2020, online). This advances goal C, to provide relevant support services for prison educators.
California Reentry and Enrichment Grant Program	\$0	In collaboration with Drs. Julie Taylor and Brian Heisterkamp, we submitted a \$500,000 grant application to offer workshops on gender identity, mindfulness, and workplace readiness for the CA Department of Corrections in August 2020. While this grant was <i>not</i> funded, we continue to look for other grant opportunities.

- 1. Continue Prison Education Project (PEP) programs
 - a. In fall 2020, Dr. Cavallaro will co-teach a PEP course ("Reading, Writing, and Rising Together") at the Prototypes Rehabilitation Facility with Dr. Vanessa Ovalle Perez and two interns (one undergraduate and one graduate).
 - b. In spring 2020, Dr. Cavallaro will teach the first credit-bearing course for this program (ENG 5140). These courses will be offered via Zoom at the Prototypes Rehabilitation Facility and, possibly, in Partnership with the Scottish Prison Service.
- 2. Continue with development of an Inside Out program with Pitzer College
 - a. Dr. Cavallaro is continuing to work with Pitzer College to establish an Inside Out Program at the California Rehabilitation Center. This course will have an equal number of CSUSB (outside) students and incarcerated (inside) students taking a course in rhetoric and writing studies. Having secured permission from the CRC to teach this course and having figured out how to enroll incarcerated students, Dr. Cavallaro is currently coordinating with AVP for Finance and Administrative Services, Monir Ahmed, as well as the College of Extended and Global Education, to coordinate enrollment logistics. As an initial step, incarcerated students who already qualify for tuition waivers (former foster care youth, veterans, and those over 60) will be the first students to enroll in this program. In March 2020, these conversations were put on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic. They will, hopefully, resume again soon.
- 3. Continue CSCE Research Internship Program
 - a. In order to continue the CSCE's contributions to research on prison education and reentry, Dr. Alexandra Cavallaro is currently conducting research on the literacy practices of queer and trans incarcerated students.
 - b. Continue collaborative project with Dr. Tobi Jacobi (Colorado State University) and Dr. Wendy Hinshaw (Florida State University) on the politics of letter writing to and from prisons.
 - c. Internships: The CSCE will continue to provide internship opportunities during the 2020-2021 academic year. In fall 2020, an intern will assist with the creation of promotional materials for the Prison Education Project collaboration.
- 4. Facilitate a Workshop for Prison Educators
 - a. Dr. Cavallaro will co-facilitate a national workshop (online) for prison educators through the Teaching in Prison: Pedagogy, Research and Literacies

Collective at the Conference on College Composition and Communication. This March 2021 workshop titled, "Returning, but Free: Navigating Our Role as Teachers and Scholars in Prison Settings" will be held online.
