Artist Biographies



Kristi Papailler (Director)

Assistant Professor, Kristi Papailler received her MFA in Theatre Performance and graduate certificate in African American Theatre from the University of Louisville. She is an associate editor for the International Dialects of English Archive (IDEA), a member of the Black Theatre Network, and serves of the board of the San Bernardino Symphony Orchestra. Professor Papailler's credits include; Actors Theatre of Louisville, Stage One & Juneteenth Legacy Theatre which she co-founded in 1999 with Lorna Littleway, Georgia College and Sacred Heart School for the Arts. She teaches Acting, Directing, African American Theatre and Theatre History and is a Sifu in Tai Chi and Qi Gong specializing in these arts in actor training.



Leslie Bryan (Choreographer)

Leslie Bryan is Lecturer Faculty for Theatre Arts and Liberal Studies, working with CSUSB students studying to become teachers. She is the founder of the Family Night at the Theatre program and has choreographed several Theatre Arts shows including Keep Headz Ringing, Hamlet the Artist Formally Known as the Prince of Denmark, Crow and Weasel, The Invisible Man, No Child, The Trojan Women, and A Guest of Honor. Ms. Bryan is also a teacher leader for The California Arts Project providing professional development trainings in dance for K-12 teachers. What brings Ms. Bryan joy is working with children teaching them the joys of dance!



André Harrington (Costume, Hair and Makeup Design)

André holds a M.F.A. from the University of Iowa, in addition to earlier costume design training from the University of Maryland at College Park. Professor Harrington hails from the east coast, with a freelance career based in Philadelphia, PA. He has designed costumes for many professional theatre companies, including The Alliance Theatre, TheatreWorks USA, The Court Theatre, Freedom Theatre, St. Louis Black Repertory Theatre, and Crossroads Theatre. André participated in the Career Development Program for Designers sponsored by TCG/NEA and serves on the executive board of the Black Theatre Network as President. He also holds membership with USITT and TCG. Mr. Harrington is a member of the United Scenic Artists Union 829.



Jason W. Mann (Set, Sound & Lighting Design)

Jason W. Mann holds an MFA in Production Design from The George Washington University. With his business partner he Founded Veritas Scenic, Ltd., a scenic and production solutions shop out of Alexandria, Virginia as well as working as an associate designer for Design Concept Presentations also based out of Alexandria, VA. Jason's Television and Broadcast work includes design and coordination for CNN America's Studios Election Coverage, CNN's latest Cross Fire, as well as The Lead with Jake Tapper, various studios for Voice of America in Washington, DC, WETA PBS's McNeil/ Leher News Hour, as well as WETA's In Performance at the White House. Internationally, he

served as the onsite Design and Production Coordinator in the United Arab Emirates for the Emirate of Abu Dhabi's CityScape 2010 exhibit, Exibit designer for The United Nations Environment Programme's exhibit at Rio +20 in Rio de Janeiro, The International Fund for Houbara Conservation's Museum and Educational Center in Abu Dhabi, and The Environmental Agency – Abu Dhabi's Museum in Abu Dhabi.



Deitrah J. Taylor (Dramaturg)

This is Deitrah J. Taylor's first production at CSUSB and she is excited to work with the talented faculty and staff. She is grateful for the commitment and dedication of the cast in creating lasting change through theatre. Taylor believes one cannot begin to solve today's problems without a clear understanding of history. This is evident in Baltimore wherein the main character must reconcile the emergence of old racist imagery with the outward social progress of the present. Her approach anchored the production in practicing Sankofa (a word from the Akan people of Ghana meaning: Go back and get it). The root problems of systemic, institutional, interpersonal and intrapersonal racism impacting the present were

illuminated. Taylor is indebted to the entire production for embracing this journey. Deitrah has worked Kenny Leon's True Colors, Georgia College Department of Theatre and Dance and the Atlanta Black Theatre Festival as a dramaturg. Past shows for which Taylor has provided dramaturgy include: "The Piano Lesson," "Detroit '67" and "Crowns" (Georgia College), Skeleton Crew (Kenny Leon's True Colors Theatre) SoulTown- co-playwright (Atlanta Black Theatre Festival). "Special thanks to E. Delean Taylor (Mother) for introducing me to Shakespeare, Countee Cullen, Langston Hughes and theatre and Walter Taylor (Father) for tolerating my collection of books."

About the Production:

"The function, the very serious function of racism is distraction. It keeps you from doing your work. It keeps you explaining, over and over again, your reason for being. According to the National Center for Education statistics, 958 hate crimes were reported to law enforcement as having taken place on US college campuses in 2017. Of these reported incidents 437 were categorized as vandalism, 385 as intimidation and 83 were classified as simple assault. Current studies indicate that these crimes are occurring with more frequency in recent years and that the toll on students, faculty, staff and administrators at affected institutions is devastating.

In Baltimore we meet the victims and a perpetuator of one such hate crime. The probability, the reality (indeed a panel about this production triumphed over an act of racist terrorism) of this social problem must not be the status-quo. We ask you to consider a world in which hate crimes are unimageable. A world in which Shelby, Grace, Alyssa, Rachel, Fiona, Bryant, Carson and Dean Hernandez exist without the "distraction" of racism and live, learn, work and play in an environment free of hate.

Part of the Rubenstein Arts Access Program is generously funded by David and Alice Rubenstein. Additional support is provided by the U.S. Department of Education, the Dr. Gerald and Paula McNichols Foundation, The Honorable Stuart Bernstein and Wilma E. Bernstein,

and the National Committee for the Performing Arts. Our productions are entered in the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF). The aim of this national theater education program is to identify and promote quality in college-level theater productions. To this end, each production entered is eligible for a response by a regional KCACTF representative, and selected students and faculty are invited to participate in KCACTF programs involving scholarships, internships, grants and awards for actors, directors, dramaturgs, playwrights, designers, stage managers and critics at both the regional and national levels. Productions entered on the Participating level are eligible for inclusion at the KCACTF regional festival and can also be considered for invitation to the KCACTF national festival at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C.. Last year more than 1,300 productions were entered in the KCACTF involving more than 200,000 students nationwide. By entering this production, our theater department is sharing in the KCACTF goals to recognize, reward and celebrate the exemplary work produced in college and university theater across the nation.
