1. THE DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS.

During the 2020-21 AY the Center for Criminal Justice Research (CCJR) remained dedicated to servicing local community partners and providing research opportunities for faculty and students, despite the lack of University and College support. Of note, CCJR was not permitted to remain open due to COVID-19 safety protocol. Reported research activity occurred offsite.

Principal Lines of Research

Funded Research

We secured a new multi-year NIJ funded research initiative. Grants/contracts yielded an estimated \$58,585 external funds. We applied for an NSF grant (\$1,000,000); status is pending. We also applied for the "Centers and Institutes Seed Grants (CISG)" (\$25,000) with the aim of building a research specialization on Wildlife Crime within the CCJR, with a double focus: (1) applied research and extramural funding, and (2) community engagement and service-learning opportunities.

Student/Faculty Research Collaborations

- We provided 8 student research opportunities (grad/undergrad).

The remainder of this report details the accomplishments of the CCJR, as well as the ongoing initiatives.

2. DETAILED DESCRIPTION OF PRESENT AND PROJECTED ACTIVITIES.

A. DALE K SECHREST MEMORIAL FUND. Funds were dispensed to a graduate student, Ivette Jimenez, to support essential training in support of MA work (\$3,000).

- **2. Human Trafficking Network.** We formed a partnership with a working group of 20+ academics and practitioners to investigate Human Trafficking. Funded by a National Science Foundation grant and based at Baylor University, Texas, Drs. Stacie Petter and Laurie Giddens lead this team. The ongoing collaboration already produced one external grant proposal (see details below) and presently several more grant proposals in development.
- 3. Identity Theft Victimization Among the Campus Community. A partnership was formed between George Mason University (Dr. Yasemin Irvin-Erickson) and CCJR (Dr. Nerea Marteache) to design (Summer 2021) and launch (Fall 2021) an online survey on experiences of identity theft victimization among students, faculty, and staff from both campuses. Data collection will finalize in November 2021.

(ONGOING) 2019-2022 BARCELONA TOURIST VICTIMIZATION. This project originates from a partnership with the City of Barcelona (Spain) using crime data provided by Mossos d'Esquadra (regional Catalan police) and observational data gathered remotely through Google Earth, Travelocity, and Walkability.com. The project is being led by Drs. Nerea Marteache and Gisela Bichler. In 2019-2020, 27 students were involved (5 students from CJUS 550, and 22 students from CJUS 570). Additional student involvements are ongoing. In 2020-2021, 4 undergraduate students were involved (reported below).

The primary objective of the current study is to a test supposition derived from studies of crime concentration, namely that high crime places are materially different from low crime places on several observable factors that reflect land-use (e.g., presence of crime facilitators (e.g., ATMs), adjacency to other crime generators, or presence of transit hubs), urban design (e.g., narrow alleys and blind corners), and place management, as reflected in site reputation and presence of crime facilitators (i.e., alcohol, ATMs on site). If material differences exist by crime classification, we aim to continue the investigation by comparing crime classification by place type (nightlife, transit, and street locations) to see if substantive differences emerge within place types. Results will inform tourism policy.
