The mission of the ICDFR at CSUSB is to promote the optimal development and well-being of the children and families in our geographic region. We do this through education and training, research, and direct services in the community.

Over the past five years, the institute has grown its Annual externally funded project operating budget from less than \$500,000 in 2018 to over \$4 million in 2023. This has been done through continued and expanded partnerships with community partners including San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools, First 5 of San Bernardino County, San Bernardino County Sheriff's Department, Riverside County Office of Education, the Making Hope Happen Foundation, and others. Institute programs now involve 9 faculty who lead our projects supporting dozens of students in high-impact educational and professional experiences.

Programs and projects run by the ICDFR over the past five years include:

- •Running the Infant Toddler Lab School on the CSUSB San Bernardino campus (subsidized care for children of students).
- •Partnering in Quality Start San Bernardino (QSSB) and Quality Start Riverside County (QSRC), dedicated to improving quality of early childhood education throughout Riverside and San Bernardino Counties.
- •Providing parent training and mental health support for incarcerated and formally incarcerated parents and their children.
- ·Conducting research in racial equity and discrimination in early childhood education environments.
- •Conducting a CSUSB student driven tutoring program for homeless youth.
- •Offering free science-based parent education classes to parents in the local community.
- •Providing cognitive training and life-skills training to youth enrolled in community day schools in San Bernardino and at The Prentice School for children and youth with learning disabilities.
- •Sponsoring the Student Parent Resource Center on campus which provides parents with free diapers, free parent-child assessments, and access to child-friendly study space.
- •Creating education pathways at CSUSB and providing scholarships for members of the early childhood education workforce.
- •Leading a large-scale research project to study the impact of low-wage shift work on parenting and healthy child development.
- •Delivering a semi-annual peer-support suicide prevention week-long bootcamp offered free to CSUSB students.
- •Working with educators to provide training to secondary school teachers, counselors, and administrators on best practices for serving LGBTQ+ identified students.

In addition to funded contracts, the ICDFR uses its resources to provide services to students, the campus, and the community. This includes:

- Providing paid, high-impact, professional development experiences for dozens of students each year.
- •Utilizing social media and webinars featuring CSUSB/ICDFR faculty, staff, students, and community partners to provide science and best-practice based content to the community.
- •Hosting large-scale on campus events targeting critical topics including Race and Racism, Human Trafficking, and Mental Health/Suicide Prevention.
