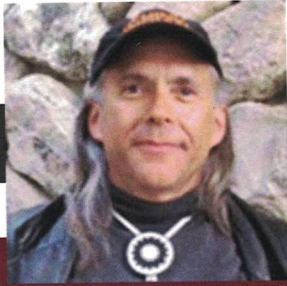
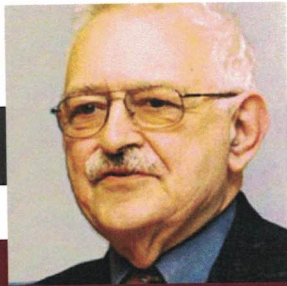

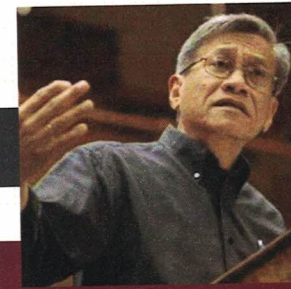
James Fenelon, a Lakota/Dakota from Standing Rock is Director of the Center for Indigenous Peoples Studies and Professor of Sociology at California State University – San Bernardino. Among his numerous books and articles are *Culturicide, Resistance, and Survival of the Lakota (Sioux Nation)*; (with Thomas D. Hall) *Indigenous Peoples and Globalization*; and *Redskins?: Sport Mascots, Indian Nations and White Racism*. James dedicates his professional life to assisting social justice struggles.



Immanuel Wallerstein is an American sociologist and historical social scientist who is best known for development of the world-systems approach. His bimonthly syndicated commentaries on world affairs are carried by many newspapers in several languages. He has been a Senior Research Scholar at Yale University since 2000. His four-volume study of *The Modern World-system* is a classic of social science literature. A leading world scholar, Wallerstein has been given many awards, including the Career of Distinguished Scholarship Award by the American Sociological Association.

Walden Bello, one of the best-known global experts on economic development, is a Filipino academic who served as a member of the House of Representatives of the Philippines until his recent resignation over government corruption and violence. While a Member of Parliament, Bello led investigations into the treatment of Filipino migrant women in the middle east. He is a professor of sociology and public administration at the University of the Philippines Diliman, as well as executive director of Focus on the Global South.



Rogelio Saenz, a former Professor of Sociology at Texas A&M, is dean of the College of Public Policy and Peter Flawn Professor of Demography at the University of Texas at San Antonio. He is also a Senior Fellow at the Carsey School of Public Policy at the University of New Hampshire. Saenz has written extensively in the areas of demography, Latinos, race and ethnic relations, inequality, and immigration. Saenz is co-editor of *Latina/os in the United States: Changing the Face of America* and co-author of *Latino Issues: A Reference Handbook*.
