EVENT: Colorado River Water Crisis

Hosted in The Oliphant Auditorium and on ZOOM



Tuesday, January 17, 2023 6:00-8:00 pm - The Oliphant Live Q & A 8:00 - 8:30 pm David Sandino

David Sandino will describe the river's hydrology and how it is influenced by drought and climate change. The Colorado River, the Southwest's most important river, brings life itself to our desert communities. The river has significant importance for the Coachella and Imperial Valleys and has dramatically influenced the Salton Sea. The Colorado River is managed and regulated through a

complex system of laws and policies known as the "Law of the River". This highly informative and engaging presentation will describe the river's hydrology and how it is influenced by drought and climate change. We'll also discuss the history of water supply development on the river, including the low reservoir levels in Hoover Dam and Glen Canyon Dam. **Register on our website under EVENTS.**

David Sandino served as Chief Counsel for the California Department of Water Resources under an appointment by Government Arnold Schwarzenegger and currently serves as senior staff counsel. He has worked on significant water, environmental, tribal, and energy issues during his thirty-year career with the Department.

EVENT: From Hubble to Webb and Beyond!

The James Webb Space Telescope (JWST) is the longawaited \$10B successor to the stunningly successful Hubble Space Telescope. More than twenty years in



development, the JWST is designed to go beyond Hubble's spectacular discoveries about the early evolution of the universe. Rather than viewing the cosmos with light in the visual and ultraviolet spectrum, JWST is exploring deep space using highly sensitive infrared instrumentation, which allows it to view distant objects that are obscured by dust clouds. This 90-minute lecture will highlight, in lay terms, the similarities and differences between two of the most ambitious and groundbreaking scientific missions in human history.

For over 50 years, **Gary Smaby** artistic eye has trained his camera lens on an eclectic range of subjects from legendary rock stars and Nobel laureates to breathtaking landscapes from Antarctica to the Serengeti.

TUESDAY, JANUARY 17

Life on the E-Ring Don Reifer Tuesday, 10:00 – 11:30 am January 17 On CSUSB Palm Desert Campus

The Pentagon is the headquarters of the Department of Defense. It is the world's largest office building consisting of 6.5 million square feet of space and housing 25,000 military and 2,000 support personnel. Its offices are connected by corridors and rings and it has 5 entrances and 5 floors). Its E-ring houses its senior personnel because it is the only one that has a view. Because it has been closed to the public since 911, few have been through the building and fewer have observed its wonders. Don will try to provide some insights to life on the E-Ring based on his service.

About the Instructor

Don currently enjoys life as a retired techie. During his career, he built software businesses, managed major projects, and served on Boards, Panels, Committees and as an advisor to Fortune 500 firms and the Government. From 1993 to 1995, he served as the Deputy to the Assistant Secretary of Defense and as the Director of the Software Initiatives Office as a Senior Executive Official (3-star equivalent) in the Pentagon. For this work, he has received many honors and accolades. He also represented the USA on visits to the USSR and China and has lectured worldwide on the role of software technology



Pan American — North Africa Lecture - A Secret WWII Mission! Peter Fleury 1:00- 3:00 PM Tuesday, Jan 17 On CSUSB Palm Desert Campus

Before the United States formally entered World War II, some 1000 American men, under Pan American Airways, developed an aerial resupply network across North Africa in support of the British war effort in Egypt. After the US war declaration, the network expanded to support allied operations all the way to China. The presenter will also highlight the Palm Springs Air Museum and its evolution into the present-day venue, exhibiting over 70 military aircraft and the people who made them fly, as well as an overview of community-oriented activities hosted throughout the year.

About the Instructor:

Peter Fleury has 20 years active flying service for the US Army and National Guard and three years as an academic instructor for the US Army, along with 26 years with Rockwell International and Boeing business development for the modernization of military aircraft in service worldwide. He has five years and over 1000 hours of volunteer service as a docent and academic instructor at the Palm Springs Air Museum

Danger In A Beautiful Place – Alfred Hitchcock's San Francisco

The Master of Suspense loved San Francisco and used its elegance, beauty and mystery to great effect in many of his films. In this virtual tour, you'll see brief scenes from Vertigo, The Birds and other Hitchcock classics filmed on location in the Bay Area. You'll hear great stories about how Hitchcock chose those locations and how he filmed them. And you'll learn why San Francisco was the perfect setting for Hitchcock's favorite themes: danger, deception, and obsession. It's a treat for Hitchcock fans and lovers of the City by the Bay.

About the Instructor:

Jay Sherwin created the Life Reflections Project to educate people about legacy letters, ethical wills, and other legacy documents. He has practiced law, worked with five different charitable foundations, and served as a philanthropy consultant and a hospital chaplain. He has extensive experience teaching and facilitating online learning programs, including recent presentations for six other OLLI programs.



Wildland Wildfires: A Discussion of Wildfires and the Wildfire Situation in America

David Haas – Wednesday, 10:00 am – 12:00 pm January 18 On CSUSB Palm Desert Campus

This presentation will discuss the current situation of wildland fires today, their increase is the past thirty years and the prospect for the future (Palm Desert is NOT in danger!). We will present relevant statistics on the number, extent, and control of wildland fires today. No one knows how American civilization, technology, and government regulations will change to minimize this new problem. The problem is growing rapidly!

About the Instructor

David Haas is an expert in the field of fire awareness. The California Department of Forestry and Fire Protection, better known as CalFire, has an all-time high budget of \$1.5 billion dollars. The 2020 social cost of wildfires to California was estimates to be \$12 billion dollars with 10, 488 buildings destroyed, 33 deaths, and millions of acres burned. In the United States, there are about 60,000 wildfires annually, \$148 billion dollars in estimated losses - 90% of which were caused by humans! Note: If you want to change your understanding of this subject, just watch "Black Saturday" on YouTube.

Keats's "The Eve of St. Agnes": The Greatest Love Poem Ever Written! Luc Agosta, Ph.D.

Wednesday, 1:00 – 3:00 pm January 18 On CSUSB Palm Desert Campus

By the time of his death in 1821 at age 26, John Keats's poetic output had exceeded, in both quantity and quality, that of any other of the world's greatest poets, including Shakespeare. His "Eve of St. Agnes" (1819), a "Romeo and Juliet" story—but with a gloriously happy ending—is a sensuous poem of great beauty and tenderness celebrating love. This course involves an introduction, reading, and discussion of the poem, perhaps the greatest love poem ever written.

About the Instructor

Dr. Agosta received his MA and PhD in English at the University of Texas, Austin. At CSU Sacramento, Luc taught courses in children's literature, English romanticism, and the Victorian Era before retiring in 2010. He has published numerous articles on children's literature and three books, Howard Pyle, E.B. White: The Children's Books, and Losing Time: AIDS Lessons in Love and Loss.



THURSDAY, JANUARY 19

Smithsonian American Art Musuem (SAAM) Visualizing Honor, Service & Sacrifice SAAM Volunteers Thursday, 10:00 – 11:00 am January 19

This course is meeting on Zoom

Visualizing Honor, Service, and Sacrifice with SAAM and ABMC (American Battle Monuments Commission) cemeteries honor the service and sacrifice of US soldiers overseas. The Smithsonian American Art Museum reveals key aspects of America's culture and history through its collection. Artists and cemetery designers have brought to life the themes of honor, sacrifice, and service through many forms of symbolism and allegory. Representatives of ABMC and SAAM contextualize the history of memorials, monuments, and art in their collections. Compare past and present meanings of specific artworks and cemeteries.

Explore the visual elements of sculpture, architecture, and 2-dimensional works to understand how their compositions convey these themes.

About the Instructor

The Smithsonian American Art Museum is home to one of the largest and most inclusive collections of American art in the world. Its holdings capture the aspirations, character, and imagination of the American people throughout three centuries. Drawing from the Museum's extensive collections, join study group leaders as they shine a light on the contributions of overlooked, marginalized, and self-taught artists from diverse backgrounds working in a variety of media who have contributed to the nation's rich visual heritage.

Music and the Holocaust: Tragedy, Hope and Legacy Emanuel Abramovits Thursday 1:00 – 2:30 PM January 19 This course is meeting on Zoom

One lecture about the role that music played in the struggle for hope in those dark times. There will be stories about the artists who died in the Holocaust, those who survived it, and the stories of the instruments that have been restored. Finally, how the events of the 30s and 40s affected American Culture in ways we had not considered.

About the Instructor:

Emanuel Abramovits has been a concert promoter since 2000, directly involved in many concerts by international artists, like Itzhak Perlman, Gustavo Dudamel, Sarah Brightman, Roger Hodgson, ASIA, Journey, Kenny G and many more. Designed and staged many original orchestral events, including an Event of the Year winner and several world premiers. He served as the Cultural Director at UNION ISRAELITA DE CARACAS from 2008 to 2019, releasing books, organizing film cycles, concerts and art exhibits. He has been consistently teaching online and in person across the US since 2020.

The music helped us get through it. It gave us a voice, an anthem, a gathering place where we shared our dreams and our fears. This is a memoir of those times by a writer who covered music and the counterculture with press credentials and a backstage pass.

About the Instructor:

James Pagliasotti was the first rock & roll columnist for The Denver Post, where he covered music and the counterculture from 1968-74. He has written for Rolling Stone magazine and numerous other publications and is the author of three books

Modern China from the Margins Jeremy Murray Mondays, 1:00 – 2:30 pm Mar 13 – 27

This course is meeting on Zoom

In this series of three lectures, Dr. Murray will consider modern China from the margins. We have learned much in recent years about China as a rising regional and global power, but beyond these headlines is a complex and hugely varied society, with cultural and religious diversity, profound economic inequality, complex gender dynamics, and much more. In both Western media and in Chinese state media, the diversity of China and its marginalized voices are often ignored. This series of lectures will shift our lens to consider China's revolution and recent rise from geographical margins like Xinjiang, Tibet, and Taiwan; to social margins related to gender and disability; to cultural and political margins and more. How does a consideration of marginalized voices enrich our understanding of modern China?

About the Instructor

Jeremy Murray teaches and writes about modern China, and has published work on Hainan island, Asian cultural traditions, and pop culture. He also coordinates the CSUSB Modern China Lecture Series and helps coordinate the CSUSB Conversations on Race and Policing. His books include China's Lonely Revolution: The Local Communist Movement of Hainan Island, 1926-1956 (2017), Asian Cultural Traditions (with Carolyn Brown Heinz, 2019), and China Tripping: Encountering the Everyday in the People's Republic (edited with Perry Link and Paul Pickowicz, 2019). He is also a 2022-23 Wilson China Fellow.

History of Coachella Valley

Just when we think we know all about one of the finest artists of the 20th Century, we discover Georgia O'Keeffe's younger sister, Ida Ten Eyck O'Keeffe. She is also an amazing, creative innovator whose artistic talent was threatening enough to compel Georgia to malign her sister's gifts to posterity by portraying her as a "minor talent unworthy of serious consideration!"The other two artists, who were teachers of mine, are Roy Kiester, a renowned American portrait artist, and Jerry Bywaters, a member of the famous "Ash-Can School of Art," and Co-founder/ Director of the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts, who attracted national recognition to the art of the southwest.

About the Instructor

complete your own legacy letter.






