During our lifetime, we have seen the appearance of a number of new diseases and conditions. Remember when there was no chronic fatigue syndrome, fibromyalgia, celiac disease, autism, attention-deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD), gastroesophageal reflux (GERD), erectile dysfunction (ED) or Alzheimer's disease? In this course, we will learn how each started as a disorder and now is thought of as a disease. How did industry and the medical profession promote this transition? A Brief History of **Photography** Gary Smaby, BA Weds, 10:00 a.m.-12:00 p.m. April 7, 14, 21

The history of photography, spanning less than two centuries, has been driven primarily by the relentless pace of scientific discovery and technological advances. This course traces the evolution of the photographic image from its discovery in 1825 to the present day. Learn how photography eventually earned respect from the art world and how the digital revolution has woven photography into the fabric of modern civilization. Explore stories about the past struggles of the pioneering scientists, inventors, entrepreneurs, and artists, and learn what the future might hold for this art form.

About the Instructor

For over 50 years, Gary 's artistic eye has trained his camera lens on an eclectic range of subjects from rock stars and Nobel laureates to breathtaking landscapes from Antarctica to the Serengeti. During his professional career, Gary was an internationally known high-tech analyst on Wall Street. Since 2012, Gary has been a visiting artist/scholar-in-residence at the University of California, Santa Barbara's Kavli Institute for Theoretical Physics (KITP). Many of Gary's photographs are in permanent collections at UCSB and the University of Minnesota.

Leonardo DaVinci: Shaping an Artistic Genius

This course will explore a littleknown aspect of artist Leonardo da Vinci's passion for interlocking knots. Learn about mathematician Luca Pacioli, who became Leonardo's apprentice, and Isabella d'Este, patron of the arts and hostess to Leonardo and Luca when, in 1499, fleeing the perils of war, the men took refuge in her castle. The sojourn creates a sketch of Isabella with a promise to be followed by a 'color portrait' of the Marchesa. Discover the intrigue of the relationships of the apprentice, the master, and the Renaissance woman and her unfinished portrait that intertwines their lives forever.

About the Instructor

Writer and filmmaker Caroline Cocciardi began an independent study on Leonardo da Vinci while living in Rome. Her 20-year research led to a DaVinci discovery, overlooked for centuries yet visible to the naked eye: Cocciardi detected that the interlocking embroidered knot pattern on Mona Lisa's dress deviated from the decorative embroidery of the day. The Mona Lisa knot was a mathematical pattern based on its angular crossing patterns. Cocciardi's 2009 documentary, Mona Lisa Revealed, reveals why the painting has no eyebrows or lashes.

Grant's fortunes turned in 1861. With the Civil War approaching, he was again offered a commission and within three years, he was in command of the Union Army, leading it to victory in 1865. Seven years later, he was elected President of the United States. As America's most important soldier, Grant invented the American way of war.

Wills, Trusts & Retirement Accounts

One of the simplest ways to provide a charitable legacy is through your will or trust. Life insurance policies, investment accounts, and retirement accounts can also be used to create your charitable legacy. You select the specific amount or percentage, and you maintain the ability to change or revoke the gift throughout your lifetime. This option is the easiest and most flexible.

Stocks

Typically, you select the stock to be gifted at its appreciated value and make an outright gift through a transfer of shares. You can minimize or eliminate taxes on capital gains, and in most cases, you can deduct the full amount of the fair market value of the stock as a donation.

Annuities

In exchange for your annuity gift, you will receive a fixed, periodic payment for life, sometimes at a higher payout than other investment options. A portion of the distributions may be tax-free or taxed at a more favorable rate. Annuities often provide an immediate federal income tax deduction for a portion of the gift.

Charitable Remainder Trusts

A charitable remainder trust allows you to receive an income now through fixed, periodic payments. At the termination of the trust, the remainder is transferred to OLLI at CSUSB. This type of trust can eliminate taxes on capital gains, plus you can select the payout rate and duration of the trust.


