

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Meeting of the Minds Symposium 2020 Goes Virtual

The Office of Student Research hosted its 9th annual Meeting of the Minds Research Symposium, as part of the Office of Academic Research's yearly Research Week festivities, designed to celebrate the academic achievements of students and faculty at the CSUSB campus.


Though Meeting of the Minds found itself, like seemingly all things, virtual, it did not deter the nearly 215 student presenters from nearly every academic discipline from displaying their work, nor the 95 faculty mentors and the 54 faculty judges.

Meeting of the Minds exhibits student work via oral and poster presentations, culminating in a one-day event wherein both graduate and undergraduate students can engage with their peers and mentors about their ongoing research.

CSUSB President Tomás Morales was quoted in his opening video for the event, saying "Studies have shown doing research with a faculty mentor is among the most memorable and inspiring activities for undergraduate and graduate students," and that "Research is a vital part of the student experience. It heightens academic involvement by encouraging and promoting student inquiry, discovery and creativity." Director for the Office of Student Research and lauded

faculty member Dr. Christina Hassija echoes President Morales in her remarks, "Today your work here is one piece of the larger puzzle and can go on to have significant impacts. Your work today is literally defining the future".

Participants with the best oral and poster presentations received an award and were recognized during a virtual reception and award ceremony on May 15th. We are happy to congratulate the winners of the 9th annual Meeting of the Minds Symposium. You make our CSUSB community proud!

Apply To Grad School Campaign

Every spring, the Office of Graduate Studies holds an Apply to Graduate School Campaign to introduce CSUSB undergraduate students to graduate education opportunities at CSUSB. The week-long program traditionally features an open house at Graduate Studies, information sessions on our graduate programs, and application workshops.

Though campus closures meant this year's campaign was not able to take place on campus, this did not deter us from wanting to provide our students with this opportunity to explore graduate school, so we moved the party online! The virtual edition of the campaign was highly successful, boasting more than 200 students tuning in for various sessions!

We started the week with a virtual open house, which displayed our newly remodeled office space, and a meet n' greet with our Office of Graduate Studies staff. Tuesday was our Program Information Session, so we gathered our program coordinators onto Zoom and created a host of breakout rooms, one for each program. Students had the opportunity to meet program coordinators and get more information on what each program had to offer. Those who were undecided met with Erma Cross, our graduate student recruiter, for guidance and suggestions.

With Wednesday came our Application Information Session, where we went over the application process step-by-step and held a tutorial on how to write a stellar statement of purpose.

On Thursday we discussed funding opportunities available to graduate students, including tuition assistance, research, and programs designed to support those looking to go on for a doctoral degree.

We wrapped up the week with the ever-popular Office of Student Research. Representatives talked about the many resources they offer graduate students, including funding to attend conferences, support research, opportunities for faculty mentorship, and more. The feedback we received thus far from participating students has been wholly positive, citing the event as "extremely insightful" and "convenient to have all aspects of graduate school info housed in one event." CSUSB Offering New Graduate Programs for 2020-2021

As our university transitions to a semester system, many of our graduate programs are also evolving. Here's a look at what the new semester system has to offer:

The new **M.A. in English and Writing Studies** offers five distinct concentrations: Composition and Rhetoric, Applied Linguistics and Teaching English as a Second Language, Literature, Pedagogy, and Public and Professional Writing. Graduates are prepared to pursue teaching, advanced graduate study, and careers emphasizing writing.

The all new **M.S. in Entrepreneurship and Innovation** is an immersive experience focused on the entrepreneurship specialization. The comprehensive program prepares students to launch entrepreneurial ventures.

The **M.S. in Finance** is ideal for those pursuing a career in investments. The program trains students to be experts in investment analysis and portfolio management.

The **Master's in Public Administration** has added a concentration in Nonprofit Leadership. The focus on leadership provides those serving in the nonprofit industry with the business knowledge and skills vital to management.

The College of Education has redesigned many of its Master's in Education options into stand-alone programs. These include:

- **MA in Career and Technical Education**
- **MA in Instructional Design and Technology**
- **MA in Reading and Literacy Education**
- **MA in TESOL**

Each program focuses on developing expertise in a specific field of education, and is designed for educators ready to advance their knowledge and careers.

The college is also offering an **M.S. in Counseling** with three concentrations: School Counseling, Professional Counseling, and School and Professional Counseling.

The new **M.S. in Geology** program focuses directly on geological study and research.

This program is intended for students who wish to pursue graduate level work as a prelude for doctoral studies, or as preparation for careers in geological fields.

Psychology Department is now offering an **MS in Clinical/Counseling Psychology** and an **MS in Industrial and Organizational Psychology**. Clinical/Counseling provides students with practical skills in counseling through supervised training and experience, while Industrial and Organizational Psychology focuses on the principles and methods of psychology relating to public and private organizations.

We would advise meeting with your program coordinator to discuss your current program plan and decide which would be the most beneficial to you. If you wish to change from the quarter to the semester catalog, please keep in mind that the procedure for making this change is to work with your program coordinator to submit an updated program plan and a COPA to Melissa Cobb in the Office of the Registrar. The \$6.00 COPA fee will be waived for those grad students changing from the quarter to the semester catalog.

We hope that your summer proves a restful one, and though we will be continuing our virtual environments into fall, we are here to assist you with any questions you may have by phone, email, or Live Chat.

MBA Service Team Goes for the Gold, Achieves Top Honors from CSUSB

CSUSB's MBA Service Team accumulated more than 1000 hours of community service this year and achieved a Gold CSUSB President Volunteer Service Award – the highest honor in the category. Coordinated through the Office of Community Engagement, Gold status recognizes groups who collectively volunteered 778 hours or more. (Each individual must contribute at least 20 hours.) The team is made up of MBA students and alumni.

Throughout 2019-2020, the MBA Service Team contributed their time and talent to a broad range of activities. Service work included:

- Sharing their skills at GenCyber Girl Scout Camp
- Volunteering at local elementary school Read Across America programs and Lego League judging
- Assisting at animal shelters
- Helping out at Community Gardens
- Packing food at the Obershaw DEN
- Installing smoke detectors for less fortunate families with the Red Cross

However, the highlight of the academic year for many was the trip to Costa Rica to provide consulting services to Fundacion Mujer, a non-government organization focused on assisting women in need. From June 23rd to July 2nd, the MBA Team put their marketing and business expertise to work to develop international outreach and fundraising strategies. The MBA students spent every day consulting, researching, and developing plans to help the organization flourish.

Service Team member Kasandra Adams recalled the program's impact: "My favorite part was watching the MBA

student's passion for the project. They would stay up until 11 pm working on their different solutions and even built prototypes for a few. They truly took the knowledge they received from the MBA program and applied it. Fundacion Mujer took all of our suggestions and implemented them right away, which was phenomenally satisfying for the team."

The MBA Service Team was created in 2018, when a motivated group of MBA students and staff members decided they wanted to make a difference. They have since volunteered their time and energy to feeding the homeless at the San Bernardino City Mission, and made a trip to New Orleans to assist with ongoing recovery projects to areas still affected by Hurricane Katrina.

"The MBA Service Team started with a few MBA students with a lot of motivation and selfless hearts and has grown to make a significant impact! We were a team of 25 this year and plan to double in the 2020/2021 academic year- even if our volunteer work is virtual!" Adams said.

CSUSB Alumna Ariana Cano Accepted into Four Prestigious Doctoral Programs

Ariana Cano, a Cal State San Bernardino alumna and Communication Studies adjunct professor, has experienced an amazing academic journey. She received both her undergraduate and graduate degrees from CSUSB, was selected as both the outstanding undergraduate student and graduate student, and was chosen as the outstanding graduate teaching associate for the Department of Communication Studies in 2018. However, her biggest educational dream of earning a Ph.D. in the field of communication is still being molded. Cano was accepted into not one, not two, not three, but four prestigious doctoral programs, all fully funded. Cano received offers from the Department of Communication at the University of Massachusetts-Amherst, the Institute of Communications Research (ICR) Ph.D. program in the College of Media at the University of Illinois, the Department of Communication and Journalism at the University of New Mexico, and the Department of Communication Studies at the University of Minnesota.

"These institutions each have their own merit," Cano said. "Some are highly competitive, prestigious, rigorous, or widely recognized, which is why I feel extremely privileged to be in the position I am in right now." While Cano notes the decision was difficult, she ultimately chose the University of Illinois.

"All four institutions are well-recognized in their respect and are heavy research institutions. Therefore, my decision was not easy," she said. Cano's research interest derived from the communication studies master's program at CSUSB with her thesis, "Performing Stereotypical Tropes on Social Networking Sites: How Popular Latina Performers Reinscribe Heteropatriarchy on Instagram."

"Her thesis was an innovative mix of performance theory, political economy, and critical theory, where she was able to show how the old tropes of racism, sexism, and capitalism reappear in new media forms and practices in the guise of liberation," said her advisor and mentor Rod Metts, Associate Professor of Communication Studies.

"This sophisticated study will prove to be a significant contribution to new ways of thinking about Latinx representations in new and non-traditional media."

"I feel that my hard work and that of those who have supported me is paid off," Cano said. "The process of applying to Ph.D. programs is one long journey that I believe will prepare me to navigate the doctoral experience forthcoming. This process is not achieved without great effort; I had my share of trial and errors. But as it has been proven, the outcome is worthwhile! Based on the skills I have acquired, I am prepared and excited to start my Ph.D. journey in the ICR program at the University of Illinois!"



Office of Graduate Studies Goes Virtual

Spring 2020 necessitated a shift to remote services, communications, workshops, and events. COVID-19 became our new reality as we were asked to socially distance and rise to the challenge of a new way of living our lives. In response, The Office of Graduate Studies team quickly transformed into a virtual space toward the end of March 2020 and gained important insight into the value of virtual offerings.

We utilized the phone, e-mail, Live Chat, Adobe Sign and Zoom to ensure that graduate students maintained access to essential services, such as meetings with the Graduate Resource Specialist, April Lane, and timely Zoom meetings for thesis consultation and review with Shelby Reeder and her team of thesis reviewers. Moreover, Professional Resource and Engagement Programs (PREP) continued to be offered across campus through Zoom. Our own Megan Kinnally led workshops on using social media during a pandemic and creative writing in the time of a pandemic. The campus

community came together to provide a wide variety of interesting virtual workshops in spring 2020. We have found that the opportunity to attend PREP workshops virtually is one valuable change as the virtual format allows access for graduate students who may not be able to attend PREP workshops in person.

The Office of Graduate Studies launched the Graduate Studies Weekly Roundup in April 2020 to provide predictable weekly communication to graduate students about upcoming deadlines, workshops, events, and available resources. Again, the Weekly Roundup has proven to be a worthwhile venture that will continue when we are physically back on campus.

Sometimes new opportunities are born out of difficult situations. Through our social distancing experience, we have learned a great deal about the value of virtual offerings, particularly how they can supplement and improve in person offerings moving forward.
