WHO ARE TRENDSETTERS?

How to Become A Trendsetter

<u>Eligibility:</u>

- Students must write a one (1) page essay in APA format with a topic that is decided by the office. Submitted essays will be evaluated by the Director.
 - Students must:
 - Have a declared major in the CSUSB Jack H. Brown College of Business and Public Administration.
 - Have completed, at a minimum, their first year at CSUSB.

<u>Responsibility:</u>

- Support the office mission to foster, nurture and cultivate an environment that is diverse, inclusive and equitable by:
 - Attending two (2) events per academic year. The office Director will select the events in collaboration with the Trendsetter.
 - Sending feedback about each event attended for the office website.
 - Encouraging other students to become a Trendsetter by distributing flyers or possibly tabling.
 - Time commitment max Approximately 20 hours per semester.

Benefit:

- There are many benefits to becoming a Trendsetter of the JHBC office of Academic Equity. Such benefits include:
 - Adding the awarded fellowship and title to resume
 - Showing responsibility
 - Meeting new people
 - Giving back to the community and peers around you
 - Developing and gaining professional skills
