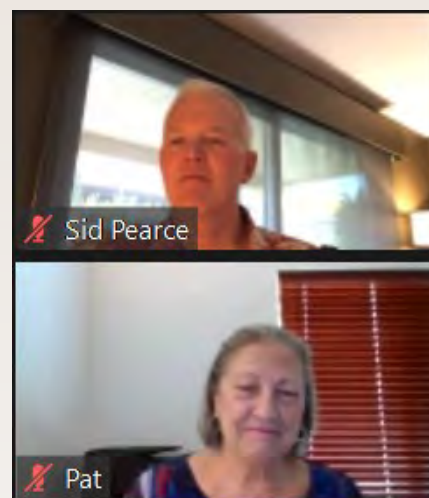

Two Historic Institutions: The Royal & the Smithsonian

David Haas, PhD

The Royal Institution of Great Britain was founded in 1799 as a forum for making science available to the public. It provides daily lectures and events primarily for journalists to learn about current science and research. Now a science museum in London, it remains committed to scientific education and research. The Smithsonian Institution, also known simply as the Smithsonian, is a trust instrument of the United States composed as a group of museums and research centers. It was founded on August 10, 1846, "for the increase and diffusion of knowledge." Come explore these two historic institutions in comparison with one another.

About the Instructor

David earned his BA in physics and PhD in biophysics in protein crystallography and molecular biology at the State University of New York at Buffalo. He helped design some of the first airport security X-ray systems in the 1970s. David and his wife, Sandra, later formed Temtec Inc., which developed and manufactured high-tech visitor and temporary IDs. Dr. Haas is the author of the book, *Personal Identification: Its Modern Development and Security Implications*. He and Sandra have more than 80 patents to their credit.

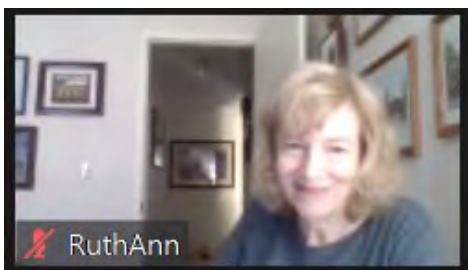
More About the Drugs in Your Life

We will explore drugs used to treat depression, anxiety, sleep disorders, Alzheimer's, migraines, and more. Learn how these drugs work, their limitations, and their costs, and why your physician might prescribe one or the other. This is a continuation and expansion of last year's course, though you can take this course without having attended last year's course.

About the Instructor

Dr. Abramson received his BA in chemistry from Western Reserve University in 1962 and his PhD in chemistry from The Ohio State University in 1965. After two years of postdoctoral experience and five years in industry, he joined the pharmacology department at the George Washington University School of Medicine in 1972 and retired after 31 years on the faculty. He holds a long-term interest in transmitting science to the general population.



Doctor Zhivago: A Poet for All Seasons

Directed by David Lean, the film features a stellar cast and memorable score by Maurice Jarre. This course will provide a recorded introduction to the film prior to class, then you rent and watch the film independently in whole or in part via a streaming service of your choice. On class day, we will meet online at 1 p.m. for an analysis and discussion of the first half of the film and again at 3 p.m. for an analysis and wrap-up of the entire film. Separate film rental fee is approximately \$4.

Choreography is the art of devising dances. Masterful choreographers invite us to be transmitted to exotic and exciting places in live theatre, as well as in motion pictures. This course is an affectionate look at two of the greatest masters, Fred Astaire and Bob Fosse. The “enchanted evenings,” in which these two remarkable dancers created and performed their magic, take us from Vaudeville to Broadway, movies to television, and changed the way the world of dance is perceived.

About the Instructor

Cash is a fine arts painter, art historian, and world traveler. He is an award-winning, internationally acclaimed Broadway producer/NY director whose career in show business spans 40 years. Chosen by Richard Rodgers to direct two Japanese productions of *The Sound of Music*, Cash was awarded the Chunichi Theatre Award, the Japanese equivalent of Broadway’s Tony Award. He founded the Musical Theatre Workshop at Southern Illinois University and was artist-in-residence at universities in New York, Illinois, Ohio, Massachusetts, California, and Texas. Cash has been teaching at the Osher Institute since 2004.

Normality & Terror: Life in Nazi Germany

Seventy-five years after the end of World War II, most of today’s research on Nazi Germany is focused on its system of terror that ultimately led to the death and destruction of millions of people. By looking at various societal paradigms, such as education, employment, cultural expression, and the role of women, this course will present fascinating insights into how the German people were oscillating between normality and terror, and how the Nazis were able to turn Germany into a brutal and horrific dictatorship.

About the Instructor

Anette is a German historian and public educator who has been presenting hundreds of programs on more than 30 different topics pertaining to her native country’s history, politics, and culture. Ms. Isaacs holds master’s degrees in American studies, political science, and history, and is an adjunct faculty member at the lifelong learning departments of five community colleges and universities in Illinois. She is also a popular instructor at Florida Atlantic University’s OLLI in Boca Raton.

Digging Deep: Health & Medicine

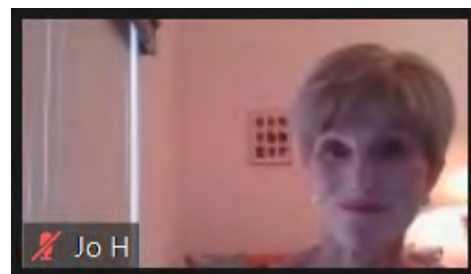

Should you be concerned about conditions like prediabetes and prehypertension? What are therapeutic potentials of illicit drugs like LSD, Ecstasy, and psilocybin? For each topic, the background, discoveries, and evaluation of risks and benefits will be presented.

About the Instructor

Dr. Abramson received his BA in chemistry from Western Reserve University in 1962 and his PhD in chemistry from The Ohio State University in 1965. After two years of postdoctoral experience and five years in industry, he joined the pharmacology department at the George Washington University School of Medicine in 1972 and retired after 31 years on the faculty. He holds a long-term interest in transmitting science to the general population.



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The L.A. Zoot Suit Riots of 1943

The Zoot Suit Riots were violent clashes during which mobs of U.S. servicemen, off-duty police officers, and civilians brawled with young Latinos in Los Angeles. The June 1943 riots took their name from the baggy suits worn by many minority youths during that era, but the violence was more about racial tension than fashion. Local papers framed the racial attacks as a vigilante response to an immigrant crime wave, and police generally restricted their arrests to the Latinos who fought back. Come learn about this divisive time in California's history.

About the Instructor

Barry has over 20 years of experience in advertising, marketing, strategic planning, and business development. He is familiar with the social media that shape and influence contemporary communications. Artists with Arthritis: Then & Now

This course will explore the determination of many artists with autoimmune diseases. We will look at artists who lived in early times with less understanding and less effective therapies for their ailments, then contrast them with artists in the current times who have benefitted from more effective therapies. Learn about artists such as Renoir, Dufy, and Outterbridge, who suffered from rheumatoid arthritis; Paul Klee who dealt with scleroderma; Toulouse-Lautrec's pycnodysostosis; and Ruth Asawa's systemic lupus erythematosus. Viewing the changes in their lives and their artistic expressions will be instructive and inspirational.

About the Instructor

Dr. Louie is the associate physician diplomate for UCLA Rheumatology at the David Geffen School of Medicine. He received his doctor of medicine degree from Washington University in St. Louis, and has served as a professor for UCLA's School of Medicine. James has presented lectures on artists with autoimmune diseases worldwide, and is the co-author of two books, *Targeted Treatment of the Rheumatic Diseases, 1st edition* and *Treatment of the Rheumatic Diseases, 2nd edition*.

Stocks

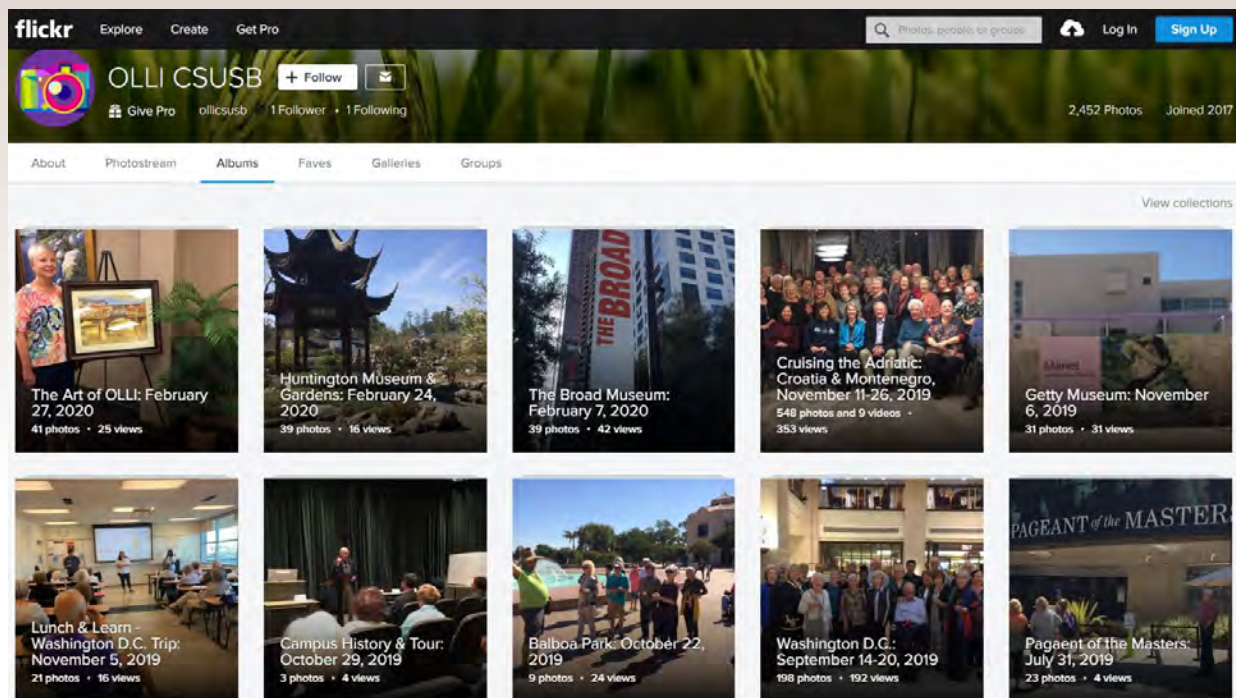
