A Brief Summary: Nationally recognized higher education leader with over two decades of executive academic leadership including service as Dean at two public research universities, NSF Division Director, ASA President, and department head. Demonstrated success leading strategic planning, enrollment growth, student success, faculty excellence, sponsored research, fundraising, interdisciplinary program development, and shared governance. Experienced in serving Hispanic-Serving Institutions and research universities while advancing academic innovation, diversity, and institutional partnerships.

Sastry G. Pantula, is the Dean of the College of Natural Sciences at CSUSB since August 2018. He is committed to training future leaders in science, and his core values are to strive for excellence, enhance diversity, and foster harmony. Prior to joining CSUSB, he served as the Director of Data Analytics programs at Oregon State University (OSU). He also served as the Dean of the College of Science at OSU from August 2013 to August 2017, after serving a three-year term as the Director for the Division of Mathematical Sciences at NSF (2010-2013). Pantula spent several years as a statistics professor at North Carolina State University (NCSU), where he began his academic career in 1982. At NCSU, he also served as the Director of Graduate Programs (1994-2002) and the Head of the Department of Statistics (2002-2010).

Pantula is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS) and the American Statistical Association (ASA). He served as ASA President in 2010 and received the ASA Founders Award in 2014. Pantula is a member of the honor societies Phi Kappa Phi, Phi Beta Delta, Sigma Xi and Mu Sigma Rho. He is also a member of the NCSU Academy of Outstanding Teachers. He directed/co-directed seventeen doctoral students and published a number of refereed publications in quality journals. He was a PI/Co-PI of NSF grants related to workforce development, vertical integration of research and education, and to enhance diversity. He was the PI of Department of Education's HSI grant titled "Advising for Undergraduate Success (A4US)" and is the PI of the grant "Proactive Approaches for Training Hispanics in STEM (PATHS)".

- **Student success** is our #1 priority; Invested funds in faculty and staff success, proactive advising, evidence-based active learning methods, learning assistants, faculty learning communities, and high impact practices like undergraduate research, study abroad, internships and community engagement are some of the keys to our student success.

- **Science Carnivals:** Initiated [Science Carnivals](#) to bring [K-12 students](#), teachers and families to give hands on experiences and show the impact of science.
- Led Department of Education **grants**- “Advising for Undergraduate Success ([A4US](#))” and “Proactive Approaches for Training Hispanics in STEM ([PATHS](#))”; led the creation of a [Science Success Center](#). Each is close to a \$5m grant for five years each.
- Through the Science Success Center, proactive and holistic advising is provided, Individual Development Plans are utilized, Summer Undergraduate Research and Science Buddies programs are supported. Comparing the Fall 2013 cohort of students to Fall 2018, 6-year graduation rates grew by 5% for the first-year-freshmen. Similarly, the 4-year graduation rates for transfer students grew by 11%. The equity gap in 6-year graduation rate for low-income students went down by 66%.
- Increased a 13% growth in **tenure track faculty** lines (115 to 130) in the College of Natural Sciences during the past eight years; recruited over 63 new faculty; we continue to work on recruiting, mentoring, retaining, and promoting excellent faculty from diverse backgrounds.
- **Chaired the DEI Board Subcommittee** (2022-2024) for Faculty Recruitment, Retention and Development. Serving on the subcommittee for Student Success (2024-)
- Our faculty developed/developing **new degree programs**- BS in Natural Sciences, BS In Health Science, MS in Applied Data Science, MS in Nutrition Science, MS in Material Science, MS in Physician Assistant, Doctor of Nursing Practice, and Doctor of Public Health, among others.
- Our faculty continue to be successful in obtaining **grant funding** for research, equipment, and workforce development. During fiscal year 2024-25, the college obtained close to \$6m in grants and submitted over \$23m in proposals. Since 2018-19, the grants obtained grew by 90% and submissions grew by 72%.
- Chaired a committee to develop a [CiRIS](#) solicitation to support faculty, each received \$32,000 for reassigned time or for other needs, with a goal to submit a significant grant following year.
- We invited **distinguished speakers** like Nobel Laureate [Carl Wieman](#), APS President Sylvester (Jim) [Gates](#), NSF Director [Rita Colwell](#), Astronaut [Kathryn Thornton](#), and Science Rapper [Baba Brinkman](#), among others.
- We are providing **professional development** opportunities for chairs, faculty, and staff. Provided training for our chairs at OSU and CSUSB by [Laura Liswood](#), “*The Loudest Duck: Moving Beyond Diversity while Embracing Differences to Achieve Success at Work,*” and by [Jackson Nickerson](#), “*Leading in the academic enterprise.*”

- As the **Director of the Data Analytics** Program, we worked on an online MS and a certificate program in Data Analytics.

9/2013- 8/2017: **Dean**, College of Science, Oregon State University

- During the four years, our College of Science (COS) built an outstanding leadership team that worked on student success, faculty success, science literacy and visibility, fundraising, and diversity. We developed a [strategic plan](#) with the mission “to advance science and build global leaders for a healthy people, living on a healthy planet, in a healthy economy.”
- **Student success**- we invested in recruiting high-achieving students (57%) from diverse backgrounds and saw a 24% growth during the four years. We raised funds for scholarships and for high impact practices, and we saw a 10% increase in 4-year (40%) and a 7% increase in 6-year graduation rates (67%) during the four years. Doctoral degrees (55) awarded grew by 90%. We developed new degrees- BS in BioHealth Sciences, BS in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, and MS in Data Analytics. Started a School of Life Sciences.
- **Faculty success**- our college recruited 23 tenure-track faculty to science: 9 (39%) are female and 9 (39%) are U.S. minorities. The total number of tenure-track faculty grew by 4% to 122. We developed a grant writing workshop for faculty, and provided additional support to our younger faculty for developing CAREER proposals. We organized quarterly lunches for faculty to discuss promotion and tenure process, innovative teaching techniques, and tools for success in research. We invested in faculty and graduate student training in communication skills with OMSI (Oregon Museum of Science and Industry) in Portland. We also brought personnel from various funding agencies and OSTP to learn about new opportunities for our faculty. As a result, the 3-year moving average of research awards to our faculty grew by 29% to \$24 million. We established two new endowments to recognize Faculty Teaching Excellence, which are open to all faculty, both tenure-track and non-tenure track faculty.
- **Science literacy and visibility**- In order to share the success stories of our *OneScience* community and educate the public regarding scientific discoveries, our college recruited an outstanding marketing team in 2014. Our marketing team wrote 455 news releases with stories related to our students, faculty, staff and alumni. Our team developed and launched a new science magazine for alumni called [iIMPACT](#), and it produced two issues per year that went to over 26,000 alumni. They also provided significant help and consultation with departmental newsletters (*Catalyst*, *Bioverse*, *Small Talk*, *The Spectrometer*, and *Meta*). We initiated a COS Distinguished Seminar series which brought thought-leaders like Carl Wieman, Brit Kirwan, Karen Wooley, John Sall, Shirley Malcom, and Jim Gates among others. We also organized a *Science Worth Spreading* event where several of our faculty presented Ted-talk style presentations to our community on Earth Day 2017 to raise the visibility of science. Our faculty also gave seminars within Oregon at various Science Pub events. Our college was also involved with outreach activities like the *Discovery Days*, *MLK Day* events, *Mi Familia Weekend*, *Juntos Family Days*, *Chemistry is Awesome*, *Discover Scientist Within*, and *Da Vinci Days* to reach out to K-12 students, especially to future students who are first in their family to consider going to college. Celebrated a year of Arts + Science ([SPARK](#)), how Arts impact Science and how Science impacts Arts.
- **Fundraising**- In addition to the visits by our department heads and faculty, the dean of science made close to 100 visits with alumni and friends each year. We hosted over 30 events each year at the dean’s residence, and the dean was present at every event

organized by the university and OSUF. During the four years, a total of close to \$14 million was raised, and the 3-year moving average of annual fundraising grew by 46% to \$3.5 million. A new *Board of Advisors* to the Dean of Science was created, who helped our college with strategic initiatives, advocacy for science and friend-raising. We also developed an annual *Alumni Awards* program and ceremony to recognize successful young alumni, distinguished alumni, faculty long-term achievement, and distinguished service to science.

- **Diversity-** Enhancing diversity was a core value for our college and was a long-term commitment to continuously make science a very belonging and welcoming place for everyone regardless of their race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, socio economic status or differential ability. In order to increase the awareness of biases, our college leadership participated in a number of diversity workshops like the one organized by the OSU ADVANCE Team and Search Advocacy workshops on our campus. We brought in distinguished speakers like Dr. Shirley Malcom and Dr. Jim Gates to celebrate and leverage the importance of diversity in STEM. We also brought the author of the book, [The Loudest Duck](#), to learn how to manage and go beyond our biases. Our college instituted hiring procedures that gave a sense of belonging and welcoming to diverse candidates, and we developed criteria to be used in promotion and tenure and annual merit evaluations. We organized conferences like [the Infinite Possibilities Conference](#) to celebrate the successes of women of color in mathematical and statistical sciences, and an Undergraduate *Women in Physics* conference to build diverse pipeline in science. We provided support for programs like the Louis Stokes Alliances for Minority Participation (LSAMP) that provides bridge programs and mentoring, the STEM Leaders Program that provides mentored first year research experience, and local SACNAS chapter, the Committee on Minorities in Science (COMS), the Black Graduate Student Association (BGSA), and Minority Association of Pre-Medical Students (MAPS) that provide peer mentoring and support. We recruited two senior Hispanic faculty members through OSU's Tenured Faculty Diversity Initiative, and we participated in a number of dual career hires at OSU.

- With a significant donation from SAS Institute founders, we worked on a three-year project for a **new building** for mathematics and statistics departments called [SAS Hall](#)-dedicated in 2009.
