

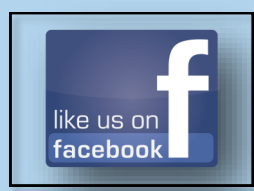

News from Melissa McQuead, Your Certifying Official

We are well on our way into the start of a new academic year. I would like to take the time to remind you of some things that will help you keep your VA educational benefits coming in a timely manner.

If you are in receipt of Chapter 30, Chapter 33, Chapter 35, Chapter 1606, or Chapter 1607 benefits, you need to fill out a new “statement of responsibility” form each quarter that you attend. You do not fill the form out until after you register for classes. You may request this form from me via e-mail at mmcquead@csusb.edu, by phone at 909-537-5213, or download the form at <http://registrar.csusb.edu> under Veteran Certification. You are also always welcome to come in person to UH-171 to request it as well. The form can be returned to me via e-mail, faxed to 909-537-7064, or turned in at the

Information Counter in UH-171. Those individuals who receive benefits under Chapter 31 or who receive the Cal Vet College Fee Waiver do not have to turn in a “statement of responsibility” form. Always remember to keep me informed any time you increase or decrease your units, completely withdraw from school, or change your major. I prefer that you e-mail me these changes because I need a written record.

If you are a Cal Vet College Fee Waiver student, you will need to make sure you have a current 2015/2016 fee waiver on file with our office. If you haven't applied yet, you can do so at any county Veterans Service office. The waiver will waive your tuition, but you will still be responsible for paying the mandatory campus fees. You must meet the California residency

requirements of your school in order to receive this benefit. The goal is to have your fee waiver on file with our office by the time tuition and fees are due.

I suggest that everyone check the www.gibill.va.gov website frequently for benefit updates and/or changes. If you haven't already set up an eBenefits account, I strongly encourage you to do so. This can be done at the same website.

Please don't hesitate to contact me if you have any questions or issues with your VA educational benefits.

Ericka Saucedo is a U.S. Coast Guard veteran and a 12-year coyote veteran who started out in Accounts Payable as an Accounting Clerk. Ericka has spent the last nine years working in the John M. Pfau Library as an Accounting Technician II, maintaining the library materials budget, as well as assisting with library exhibits, and promoting the library through the Latino Education and Advocacy Days (LEAD) and the Latino Baseball History Project. She is also a member of the Association of Latino Faculty, Staff, & Students (ALFSS).

Ericka served five years in the Coast Guard as a Store Keeper, Petty Officer Third Class (SK3). Initially stationed on the CGC Jarvis (WHEC-725) in Honolulu, Hawaii, she deployed to the Bearing Sea and the South Pacific Ocean. Selected by her command, Ericka was reassigned as the driver for the Rear Admiral at District 14 before finishing out her enlistment at the Integrated Support Command (ISC) in San Pedro, California. Ericka was honorably discharged from the USCG in 2003.

“The Coast Guard gave me direction and purpose. The skills and training I acquired made my transition into the civilian work force an easy one. Getting my degree hasn’t always been as smooth. Working full time plus having a family to take care of have prolonged the completion of my degree, so I know how hard it can be for veterans out there to do the same. The Coast Guard is a small service where your shipmates become an extension of family, and that’s an unbreakable bond. I see that same bond here at Cal State; there is a strong sense of community here. That’s what the Veterans Center is doing for our veterans.
