Pentagon Opens All Combat Jobs to Women

Defense Secretary Ashton B. Carter announced on Dec. 3 that the Pentagon has opened all combat jobs to women in the U.S. military effective 2016. They now will be able to drive tanks, fire mortars, become snipers and lead infantrymen into combat. Their role will not be limited to conventional combat arms occupations either. "They'll be allowed to serve as Army Rangers, Green Berets, Navy SEALs, Air Force PJs and Marine Corps infantry," stated Mr. Carter.

The military faced a deadline set by the Obama administration three years ago to fully integrate combat jobs in the U.S. military or ask

for specific exemptions. The Navy and Air Force have already opened all combat jobs to women, with the Army following suit. The announcement was a rebuke to the Marine Corps, which requested an exemption for infantry and armor positions, citing a yearlong study that showed integration could hurt its fighting ability. "When I became secretary of defense, I made a commitment to building America's force of the future. In the 21st century that requires drawing strength from the broadest possible pool of talent. This includes women," Mr. Carter told reporters.
