College/Unit Highlights (unedited) Oct. 30, 2018

Jack H. Brown College of Business and Public Administration

Strategic Plan Goal 1

- The MBA office has increased enrollment for the Fall 2018 quarter. Their goal was 70 enrolled students (55 Traditional and 15 Professional). The final acceptance date was September 7th, 2018. There were 232 (208 Traditional, 24 Professional) unique applications, 56 (53 Traditional, 3 Professional) missing transcripts, 171 university complete applications, 117 (97 Traditional, 20 Professional) accepted students, and 83 (66 Traditional, 17 Professional) enrolled student.
- The MBA program held Fall orientation in conjunction with the College of Extended Learning, allowing a zoom session for all online students. This took place on Sept. 29, 2018. There were 67 on campus MBA students that attended and 3 online MBA students that attended the on campus event.
- The MBA office met with the Center for Global Management to begin a collaboration for the upcoming MBA service trip. This year, the MBA program will go to Costa Rica.
- The MBA office elected 4 Student Ambassadors (Jose Carreno, Yomara Donis, Jamie Segovia, Sarthak Arora, Jacqueline Padilla) to represent the MBA program to students and the university. These students are selected because of their involvement with the campus, other students, and academic achievements in the MBA program.
- The MBA Office organized a graduate student recruitment event at CSU Dominguez Hills (September 26) and CSU Long Beach (September 13).
- Meet the Firm Event (October 11, 2018): 25 local firms and government divisions came to campus to provide internships and jobs to students. Around 160 CSUSB students interacted with professionals to understand practicality and the job market.
People involved: BAP (Beta Alpha Psi) and ASA (Accounting Student Association) and Department of Accounting and Finance.
Impact: The event supports our student success – job searching and internship. Many Accounting students found jobs or internships at this event. Participating firms also confirmed quality of our faculty members and accounting program.

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- Goldman Sachs Webinar (October 23, 2018): Controller Team members in Goldman Sachs shared their invaluable experience and knowledge and internship opportunities with around 90 CSUSB students.
People involved: : Controller Team in Goldman Sachs (Salt Lake City, Utah), FMA (Financial Management Association), BAP (Beta Alpha Psi) and faculty members of Dept of Accounting and Finance.
Impact: Students learned about global financial institution, roles of controller team, skills and knowledge for career success, etc. This webinar exposes our students to reality in the financial world and positively influence them to re-consider potential career development and way of thinking.
- The AMA (American Marketing Association) Inland Empire had their event in Rossa's Cucina Enoteca in Ontario. This was a lunch and learn opportunity featuring Mike Shaffer, owner of Echo Factory. Echo Factory is a specialty marketing firm in Pasadena. Mike's talk was called "Multi-Million Dollar Brands Back Story".
People involved: Attending the event were five CSU Marketing students from the AMA club. Students in attendance were: Jackelyn Carbajal, Jonathan Andrade, and Johnny Ramirez – AMA Leadership. Also in attendance were club members, Kevin Babbitt, and new member, Ty Rothman.
- The IDS department has initiated a new degree program in "Business Analytics" for the "National Economic University", NEU, in Hanoi, Vietnam, and a preliminary agreement has been reached with that university officials last week. The Office of Extended Education has been instrumental in making the process feasible and drafted the preliminary agreement along with the IDS department. The Vietnamese students can come and complete their BA in Business analytics at our university after completing their 1st 2 years of course works in NEU, Vietnam. The IDS department will provide them with the needed curriculum and provides articulation of their transferred courses.
- Public Administration Department has been selected by ATI (Academic Innovation & Technologies) to pilot a new Cal State Program called Blackboard Ally which seeks to promote accessibility to online classes. This pilot exercise will lead to a university-wide effort.
- In fall quarter Public Administration department began their third San Bernardino County Employee cohort with students taking PA 611 and PA 664 as their initial courses. The cohort is scheduled to complete in approximately two years.

Strategic Plan Goal 2

- Dr. Alexandru Roman, RIPMG (Research Institute of Public Management and Governance) Director, conducted a workshop "Leadership and Team Building" for Administrative Services Division-Contracts at Riverside, CA on July 18, 2018.
- Professor Melika Kordrostami from Marketing department published a paper "Children's media socialization: parental concerns and mediation in Iran" on September 14, 2018. (Kordrostami, Melika, Akshaya Vijayalakshmi, and Russell N. Lacznia) This paper is published online at Journal of Marketing Management with is ranked A in the ABDC (Australian Business Dean's Council) journal listing.

- Lisa Gordon was awarded “President’s Annual Team Achievement Award” for working with the Staff Development Center Implementation and Advisory committee. She contributed towards the fulfillment of 2015-2020 Strategic Plan.
- Professor Rami Tameez received top advisor award from Gradient investments. This award is given to 5 individuals per year out of 20,000 licensed financial advisors. In addition to this award Rami Tameez also received #5 in the nation award from Great American, one of the largest financial companies in the nation.

Goal 3

- Professor Taewon Yang is a part of AGA (Association of Government Accountants). Taewon is currently the education committee chair and he is currently working with AGA to introduce their career/job fair to accounting students who are interested in government sectors.

AGA members work in government financial management across sectors and worldwide, working to increase government financial performance and accountability. They educate themselves via training events to ensure they are always up to date on the most relevant news and information, and boost their credentials via certification.

- The LTC (Leonard Transportation Center) had their Advisory Council meeting on October 5th, 2018. The LTC staff, faculty and students went over all the upcoming projects and made an action plan to execute them.

People involved: LTC Staff, Faculty and Students, Transportation professionals from public and private sector: WRCOG, SB Airport, CPP, UCR, Caltrans, Omni trans, SCAG, Foothill Transit.

Impact: Maintain structure on current LTC projects and gain constructive criticism from council members. Review progress of Regional Mobility Dialogue, allow council members to give feedback and impact the center positively so that way are able to move forward with research. Create action plan for future projects, such as Pathway to Logistics Program.

- The LTC (Leonard Transportation Center) attended the 2018 Mobility 21 Southern California Transportation Summit. This year’s summit was titled “California: Transportation Center of Excellence”

People involved: LTC staff and faculty

Impact: Attending the summit gave the LTC staff a chance to network with local transportation professionals and gain support for the Leonard Transportation Center’s current research projects as well as raise awareness about our Regional Mobility Dialogue Series and gain potential sponsorships. While networking we were able to promote our programs excellence. Also gave faculty and staff a chance to recruit potential fellows for our Advisory Council. (October 19, 2018)

Goal 4

- On September 12, 2018, Dr. Alexandru Roman (RIPMG Director) promoted CSUSB, JHBC –Public Administration department and RIPMG by giving a presentation on “Professionalizing Public Procurement” for the Orange County Procurement Office.
- Leonard Transportation Center conducted their fourth of six Regional Mobility Dialogue Series on September 11, 2018. Participants included from both public and private sectors in the region

including the County of San Bernardino. This dialogue series addressed the future of transit and rail. Key speakers included, Erin Rogers, Deputy General Manager, Omnitrans, Elliot Greenberger, Market Manager Southern California, Lyft, Carrie Schindler, Director of Transit and Rail Programs, SBCTA, Hannah King, Graduate Transportation Researcher, UCLA.

Impact: To bring together community participation in efforts to solve regional transportation problems. Many are not aware of how this issues will directly affect our region, so our goal is to inform them and plan ahead. This dialogue series discussed the role transit and rail have played in the past and what role they may have in the future.

- LTC was a part of Caltrans District 8 Innovation Fair (September 19, 2018): The LTC had a booth at the Innovation Fair and gave Caltrans employees as well as local community members information on our current and upcoming projects. There were various transportation companies present such as, SCAG, SBCTA, and UCR. The LTC gave Caltrans employees information on the Transportation, Leadership, Planning and Performance Institute. We also handed out information on the LTC as CSUSB's Transportation Center and our Cybersecurity Report with WRCOG. They are also able to gain a stronger following on our social media outlets. LTC raised awareness of their presence in the Inland Empire and that they are actively working towards solving transportation issues in our region.

- The National Science Foundation has awarded \$749,869 to CSUSB as part of a \$4.3 million grant to recruit and mentor 30 students from five community colleges to ultimately work in cybersecurity in federal agencies and departments. As a part of three-year grant for the Community College Cyber Pilot Program, the CSUSB Cybersecurity Center will partner with Whatcom Community College in Bellingham, WA.

Impact: "The program is designed to increase the level of diversity among students enrolled in cybersecurity programs and allow members of underrepresented communities to engage in the field. The CSUSB center will be mentoring students, specifically with veterans and adults who need "retooling" to meet the needs of cybersecurity and government service." -Tony Coulson, Director, Cybersecurity Center.

- From October 31st-November 2nd Melissa Farley will be attending the second annual AACSB Diversity and Inclusion Summit. This summit offers various workshops, breakout sessions and small group discussions all revolving around the topics of inclusion and diversity best practices at other AACSB business schools.
- The JHBC Office of Inclusion and Engagement is working on the following projects.

- We are looking into partnering with other departments across campus to have The Defamation Experience <http://defamationtheplay.com/> come to CSUSB. This is a nationally acclaimed diversity program that explores issues such as race, religion, gender, class, and the law.
- The JHBC Office of Inclusion and Engagement is currently writing their strategic plan.
- The JHBC Office of Inclusion and Engagement is working on planning events for the rest of the 2018-2019 academic year; as well as creating a calendar for events that will become annual going forward- such as WEW and The Pioneer Breakfast (purchased a table last February).
- The JHBC Office of Inclusion and Engagement reached out to the attendees of our Women's Entrepreneurship Week; a survey has been sent out to evaluate the event.
- Dr. Francisca Beer (Director of the JHBC Office of Inclusion and Engagement) submitted a photo and caption for the Lost and Found- photo Exhibition. In July Dr. Beer attended the "Ghana Calls" faculty seminar in Accra, Ghana. This photo exhibition is a joint effort amongst the CSUSB Anthropology Museum and Education Abroad.

College of Education

COE (overall)

- Dr. Marita Mahoney (Office of Assessment & Research) and Diana Quijano (Office of Curriculum and Archives) presented to the CSU Analysts and Admissions Staff at their meeting in Sacramento (via Zoom) on October 9. Their presentation was entitled: *CSU San Bernardino PeopleSoft Credential System* [Mahoney, M.L, Chiang, T., & Quijano, D. (2018, October)].
- The 12th Annual DisABILITY Sports Festival was held on October 6 at CSUSB. Considered to be one of the largest events showcasing adaptive sports, this year's more than 800-participants and 250-volunteers marked this free event's most successful to-date. The keynote speaker, Aaron "Wheelz" Fotheringham, is a four-time professional wheelchair motocross (WCMX) champion and tours with Nitro Circus. The festival featured more than 25 different sports, including archery, wheelchair and standing basketball, tennis, soccer, wall climbing, skateboarding, swimming and hand cycling; each coached by an athlete with a disability. New at this year's festival was the Light Saber Academy demonstrating adapted fencing, featuring performances of Imperial Stormtroopers and Jedi Knights. Coordinated by board members across the CSUSB campus (Dr. Marissa Congdon-COE/SRC, Dr. Guillermo Escalante-CNS, Ms. Ginger Hartman-COE/Development, Ms. Kahadda Poston-Student, Ms. Viridiana Guzman Perez-Student, Ms. Yvonne Salmon-COE/Development, Dr. Shannon Sparks-COE/SRC, Dr. Sang Ouk Wee-CNS and Dr. Priyanka Yalamanchili-COE/SRC), the DisABILITY Sports Festival is run completely from the donations and support of donors and sponsors.

Educational Leadership & Technology

- On October 20 at the 2018 Fall CAPEA Conference in San Diego, Dr. Becky Sumbera (Faculty) was elected to serve as President-Elect for the California Association of Professors of Education Administration (CAPEA).

Special Education, Rehab & Counseling

- Dr. Connie McReynolds (Faculty & Institute Director) presented her published research article entitled *Neurofeedback: A Effective Treatment for Symptoms of Post-traumatic Stress Disorder*

(PTSD) in Veterans at the International Society for Neurofeedback & Research in Phoenix, AZ on October 19.

- The Institute for Research, Assessment and Professional Development was re-accredited by the Department of Rehabilitation for the provision of Comprehensive Vocational Evaluations and Extended Situational Assessments. The report contained zero findings with only two minor recommendations; the three year re-certification was effective October 16.

College of Natural Sciences

Chemistry

- Dr. Andreas Beyersdorf is serving on a panel that is determining where to place additional air sampling stations in the Inland Empire. This work is in response to AB 617, which directed the South Coast Air Quality Management District to more accurately monitor the air quality in areas of greatest concern, including Inland Southern California.
- The department was awarded to VETI grants last spring: 25K to purchase an FTIR (Fourier transform infrared) spectrometer and workstation for organic chemistry, and 89K to purchase an ICP-OE (Inductively Coupled Plasma Optical Emission) spectrometer for upper division/graduate analytical analysis and research. The FTIR is already installed and being used by hundreds of students this fall.
- The ICP-OE is being installed this quarter. The FTIR replaces a workhorse instrument; the ICP-OE adds new analytical capabilities.
- The department received a donation of a high-end used GC/MS/MS instrument worth about 100K (used price) from a government lab that upgrades every five years. This also adds capabilities for research that we do not currently have.

Computer Science

- CSE received \$36K EO 1110 fund to re-design CSE 201 for the reduction of DFWI rate.
- CSE renovated the school seminar through the coordination between CSE office, CSE student club and a faculty volunteer. The schedule of the presentations given by students for their internship, independent study, MS thesis, by faculty on their research, and by invited speakers outside CSE or CSUSB will be posted at CSE website, announced to CSE club members by CSE club. To encourage student participation, attendance is taken and students may earn extra credit by participating in a number of seminars. This mechanism will promote students participation in High Impact Practices.
- CSE is collaborating with Math Department on MSTI grant. Approximately \$17,000 will be allocated to fund tutoring in computer science. It will help CSE club, which used to provide free tutoring service, to recruit and pay tutors for a quality and sustainable tutoring service.
- CSE junior faculty Yunfei Hou is active in community outreach. He participated in Riverside Transportation Report, a lunch meeting with the new secretary of Cal State Transportation Agency and new director of California Department of Transportation, at the Mission Inn Hotel and Spa in Riverside, California. I also participated in the 5th Regional Mobility Dialog Meeting at Leonard Transportation Center, attended the presentation given by a speaker from Lyft, Omnitrans and SBCTA at Loma Linda University.

Geology

- Geology Faculty participated in the Great California ShakeOut Earthquake Drills with classes practicing how to Drop, Cover and Hold On on October 18. 2018 is the 10th Anniversary of

- ShakeOut, which began in southern California in 2008. Participating is a great way for individuals to be prepared to survive and recover quickly.
- Dr. Joan Fryxell took 15 geology majors on a weekend field study in Rainbow Basin.

Health Science

- Dr. PaulChris Okpala recently presented at a conference in Tokyo, Japan. The title of his talk was Social Support Provision for the Aging and Associated Health and Socioeconomic Effects on the providers.
- Dr. Claudia Davis is working with Doug Kleam, CEO/President of St. Bernardine Medical Center to explore additional internship opportunities for HSCI students.
- Dr. Monideepa Becerra presented at the World Congress on Advanced Nursing and Quality in Health Care. The topic of her talk was Suicidal Ideation Among Veterans.
- Dr. Monideepa Becerra presented at the Lilly Conference on Higher Education. The topic of her talk was LGBTQ Curriculum in Public Health.
- Dr. Dorothy Chen was elected president of Phi Kappa Phi.

Mathematics

- Last year, Lynn Scow spearheaded a program to pilot the Pathways to Calculus curriculum in the developmental math program. The pilot was used to inform and develop the curriculum for the first session of ESM and our Math 110-120 sequence. She recently received data that supported the hypothesis that students who engaged in the pilot program would be more likely than those enrolled in the traditional developmental math program to successfully complete GE math. These are encouraging results that bode well for the new curriculum being developed.

Nursing

- Two of our faculty (Dr. Teresa Dodd-Butera and Dr. Younglee Kim) have received Community Based Research Awards. These awards were collaborative with other faculty and students.
- Dr. Burch and Angie Gagalang will be presenting the ADN-BSN Collaborative Model at the COADN-CACN conference in San Diego on 10/26/18.

- Faculty and student members of the Rho Beta Sigma Theta Tau International Honor Society of Nursing along with junior and senior CSUSB nursing students participated in the Flying Doctors event in Thermal, CA. This event provided free medical services for uninsured families in the Coachella Valley.
- The Rogers Scholar Banquet was held October 2nd in the Capra Ballroom at La Quinta Resort. Seven of the thirteen 2018 Rogers Scholars are nursing students.
- Faculty at PDC and SB hosted school children in our nursing labs to encourage future enrollment in health care, in particular, nursing.
- Dr. Mary Anne Schultz (previous chair) and Angie Gagalang (BSN Director) have been awarded an NIH/AACN grant for \$10,000.

Physics

Recent graduate, Manuel Paul, was awarded a National Science Foundation Graduate Research Fellowship in large part based upon the success that he had at CSUSB as an undergraduate researcher. This is a very competitive process.

College of Extended and Global Education

- CSU Extended Education Counterparts Meeting: College of Extended and Global Education successfully co-hosted with Cal Poly Pomona the 2018 CSU Extended Education Oasis Counterparts Conference held at Palm Springs from October 10 through 12. The theme for the conference was Reflect-Refresh-Renew. President Morales opened the conference greeting over 285 participants from throughout the CSU system. The keynote speech was delivered by the CSU Executive Vice Chancellor for Academic and Student Affairs, Dr. Loren Blanchard, who spoke about his career path, diversity in education, and the importance of extended education. The participants came to share best practices and enhance their skills needed to deliver engaging international and domestic programs.
- Summer Session 2018: Contributing to the Graduation Initiative, CEGE led successful campus-wide efforts to promote summer school participation and increased FTES enrollments by 20% and headcount by 13% compared to 2017. Over \$8.6 million was awarded in financial aid with over \$3 million coming from the CSUSB institutional financial aid. The overall amount of financial aid representing a 23% increase over 2017. Over 65% of students enrolled were seniors. As part of the Graduation Initiative, graduating seniors received approximately one million dollars in Graduation Initiative Grants to assist them in graduating sooner.
- Professional and Continuing Education Programs (PACE) department established a new partnership with City of Hesperia to offer PACE programs at a discounted rate. This will afford greater professional development opportunities for city employees and will increase exposure to PACE programs.
- Online Criminal Justice Degree Completion program experiences a 46% increase in accepted students for fall 2018.
- Study Abroad Office is in full swing of its recruitment efforts and have reached 343 students through holding information sessions at different events and making presentations at courses.

- Study Abroad office together with the Consulate of Mexico in San Bernardino and the Inland Empire Hispanic Leadership Council, held Mexico Study Abroad Welcome Back Breakfast on October 5, 2018.

- International Orientation: the total of 220 new students participated in International Student Orientation.
- Partnership Programs: A total of 93 Cohort Students were enrolled in Fall 2018.

- Visiting Scholars: A total of 9 visiting scholars from China, Korea, Vietnam, and Czech Republic were on campus in Fall 2018.

International Admissions:

- Started implementation of Radius software for international Recruitment and Admissions with first communication going out on October 29. . First Campaign set to target those with incomplete applications. The use of Radius software will allow International Admission team to conduct automated recruitment campaign for leads with series of emails.
