## **College of Arts and Letters**

#### **Student Success**

- ART: Studio Arts Club students organized and opened an exhibition of their works at Viva La Boba, on 4th Street in Downtown San Bernardino, Saturday May 25th. This group exhibition features photographics works by Margie Fletcher, Juan Carillo-Dominguez, James Dailey and others. It will be on display to the public for two months.
- ART: Tuesday May 7th students from Associate Professor Andrew Oakes's graphic design class were awarded a certificate by Dr. Laurie Smith, Director of The School of Social Work at CSUSB, in recognition of their outstanding design and branding work for the events surrounding the National Mental health Awareness Month campaign on campus organized by SSW. As a PBL HIP, the students engaged with Dr. Smith and her colleagues, their client, to develop and produce various design assets that are now being used to promote the events.
- ART: Students from Dr. Francis Houlihan's UX/UI class presented working prototypes of an app for finding free parking spaces at CSUSB to the ITS/ATI team, in the middle of this quarter, which was a PBL experience (HIP) where the students developed for a client (ITS/ATI) a new digital mobile application product. Following their presentations, Dr. Mihaela Popescu, Team Leader of ATI, has offered the students to actually produce the app for CSUSB, and to work for ATI as paid student assistants to continue working on this and other UX./UI initiatives, to present to the campus leadership team at some point in the future, and to ultimately present to the CSU ITS leadership working group following this.
- ENG: On Thursday, May 2, the English department held its annual spring Strategic Employability in English (SEE) event, bringing back 5 alumni panelists to meet with current students talk about career paths. About 50 current students attended.
- ENG: The Pacific Review sponsored an Open Mic event on Thursday, May 9 in PL 5005.
- ENG: Undergraduate student Aubrey Guldemond (linguistics) and MA student Victoria Porraz (Comp/Lit) were recognized as CAL outstanding students for 2018-19.
- MUS: To celebrate the partnerships we share with the local colleges, The San Bernardino Symphony's performance of Gustob Holst's *The Planets* also included 11 outstanding strings students from Cal State San Bernardino's <u>Orchestra Department</u> who study with <u>Dr. Lucy Lewis</u>

- ART: Professor Annie Buckley and her team of CBA/PAC student assistants, interns and staff members have organized an exhibition of prison inmate art to be held at The Garcia Center for the Arts, in San Bernardino. The exhibition opens Friday May 10th, and runs until June 9th, 2019. Art works from inmates at six different correctional facilities will be exhibited.
- WLL: 2 students received scholarships from the Phi Beta Delta Honor Society at their annual banquet.
- WLL: The second annual Taiwan Fair was held on Thursday, May 23. Activities celebrated the Dragon Boat Festival, a long standing tradition in Chinese culture. Over 100 participants included CAL Interim Dean Rueyling Chuang and President Morales.
- WLL: 24 Spanish majors were initiated into Sigma Delta Pi, the National Hispanic Honor Society on Thursday, May 23.
- WLL: The Korean Foundation awarded scholarships to 31 student to travel to Korea.
- ART: Graduating, 3rd year, MFA Studio Art student Frederick Brashear was voted as one of two CAL Outstanding Graduate Students in the college for AY2018-19. We are very proud of all of Fred's achievements in his art practice, exhibition record and his general service to the Department of Art & Design. Needless to say, Fred is also the Department of Art & Design Outstanding Graduate Student for AY2018-19.
- ART: 2rd year, MFA Studio Art student Halyie Roché, has been awarded a Graduate Equity Fellowship Award this year. This is based on need, but is also judged on the excellence of the performance of the student. Haylie has progressed so much in her studies on the MFA Studio Art and continues to be very dedicated and hard working.
- ART: Graduating, 3rd year, MFA Studio Art student Halima Ladbon opened her solo thesis exhibition at the Dutton Family Gallery, RAFFMA, Thursday 16th May, titled "Summer Skin." This ambitious light installation will run for two weeks, and is open to the public. The exhibition/installation combines fabric and LED lights that change colour and intensity over a 24 hour period replicating the colour of the skies over Hawaii in a typical winter's day. This is the result of a year's worth of research into artistic, scientific, and electronic engineering methods to produce this sublime experience in the gallery.
- ART: Graduating senior in the BA in Art Plan II Studio Art program, Rinoi Imada, opened a solo exhibition in VA106 gallery, Thursday 23rd May, which will run for 4 weeks, titled "Dialogue". Rinoi came to CSUSB from Japan specifically to study glass-making with Professor Katherine Gray. Over her years at CSUSB, Rinoi has become very expert in many glass-making techniques and has begun to experiment widely within the medium. The exhibition features her most recent glass works as well as pyrography (drawing with heat/fire). Further to this, Rinoi also has a solo exhibition of her glass works at the Little Gallery of San Bernardino, opening Sat 25th May.
- RAFFMA: Student Assistant, Maia Matheu presented about her study abroad experience of visiting ancient Egyptian sites and excavating at Wadi-el-Hudi during the Philanthropic Foundation Board Meeting on May 23.

#### **Community Engagement and Partnership**

- ART: Professor Matthew Poole visited San Bernardino Valley College to review the annual SBVC Art Department Student Show, a new partnership with Professor Mandi Batolo, Chair of the Department of Art at SBVC, and he will return Wednesday 8th May to award a recognition prize/award to one of the SBVC exhibiting student artists. This partnership is planned to be an annual occurrence to strengthen the partnership of CSUSB and SBVC's art departments, and to encourage SBVC art students to transfer to CSUSB.
- WLL: The annual IEFLA (Inland Empire Foreign Language Association) Honors Awards Ceremony was held on Wed, May 1. Some of our own students were honored along with local high school students. Around 500 people attended the event and Interim Dean Chuang and Interim Chair McGovern addressed the attendees. The event is co-sponsored by the Department of World Languages and Literatures.

- WLL: Korean Festival was held on Friday, May 3. Festivities included a mock traditional wedding ceremony and food prepared by celebrated Korean Chefs
- WLL: Interim Chair Thomas McGovern was the lead teacher and Prof Juan Delgado (ENGL) assisted in working with Chaffey High School students on a photography/storytelling projects for 6 weeks. The photographs and stories were exhibited at the Ontario Museum of Art and History on Thursday, May 2.

#### Special Education, Rehabilitation & Counseling

- Dr. Connie McReynolds (Faculty and Director, Institute for Research, Assessment & Professional Development)
  - Consultant for Moreno Valley Elementary School for a boy with auditory and visual processing difficulties. She provides the school district with support and recommendations for classroom accommodations to enhance the child's academic development based on the assessment conducted in the clinic
  - Requested to serve as dissertation chair for three Loma Linda University Clinical Psychology doctoral students; one will defend this summer and one in the fall. This partnership with Loma Linda University Clinical Psychology Department is enhancing the robust nature of the research agenda of the Institute for Research, Assessment & Professional Development. Two international publications have resulted from these collaborations. Dissertation topics in progress include an analysis of the differences in post-traumatic stress disorder between military and civilian groups treated in my clinic with neurofeedback; and an examination of the impact of auditory and visual processing disorders on anxiety comparing traditional talk therapy with neurofeedback interventions outcomes achieved in the clinic.
  - The initial neurofeedback professional development training phase with the staff of a domestic violence shelter in Bear Valley has been completed. The five staff members of the shelter have been trained as neurofeedback technicians. The Institute will expand our service delivery into this domestic violence shelter over the summer and provide clinical case management and staff support. Neurofeedback treatment will be provided for survivors (adults and children) of domestic violence as part of the services within the domestic violence shelter. This is a new line of business for the Institute in expanding the professional development branch of the Institute and providing neurofeedback clinical supervision / case management support to a community based agency.
  - Consultant to North Shore Elementary School in Bear Valley teachers and administrators training them on auditory and visual processing disorders in elementary children. She provides the teachers with classroom accommodation suggestions to better address negative behaviors and enhance academic outcomes. These interventions are coupled with the use of neurofeedback to treat the processing disorders in the children. Midpoint assessments of the children receiving in-school neurofeedback treatment reveal

robust outcomes for our pilot project. Teachers are reporting improvement in the children's academic abilities.

- Dean Rose of JHBCBPA has granted approval to provide a 15% discount for employees of employers that sign partnership agreement. This will only apply to the Online MBA program. Additionally the requirement for professional work experience has decreased from 5 years to 2 years. We anticipate this will assist in recruitment and allow us to be more competitive.
- Summer recruitment remains in full swing. Campus was branded with Don't Let Summer Melt Away" and focused on an ice cream theme. Summer 2019 will be the last summer before Q2S with full 3 sessions: 10-week session and two 6-weeks sessions.
- Our goal was to achieve 10% over last year headcount of 4,258. As of May 29, we have exceeded the goal with 4,930 students registered and 2912 FTES. The headcount is 11% higher and FTES is 10% higher than the numbers at the same time last year.
- SAG & GIG over 1959 students have been awarded over \$3.3 million. Dean Karmanova secured and approved additional SAG funds of **\$641,500** to package remaining students.
- GIG Grant 315 students were deemed eligible for GIG and all students have been funded. There are 20 students waiting to get into the required courses before Financial Aid can award their GIG.

## **Community Engagement**

 Over 80 University Honors Program students volunteered on a Friday afternoon at Helping Hands Pantry to help sort food for families in need in the San Bernardino area. Over 7,000 people per week receive assistance from Helping Hands Pantry through their distribution center and mobile food bank. Helping Hands Pantry also supplies canned goods and produce for the shelves of The Obershaw DEN food pantry. Our Honors students showed their Coyote pride by sorting over 21 large bins of donated fruits and vegetables in less than 90 minutes!
