Jack H. Brown College of Business and Public Administration

Strategic Plan Goal 1

- IECE developed and implemented a "Super-Biz Heroes" class instructional project for visiting Promise Scholars in conjunction with the Office of Admissions and Student Recruitment. IECE served approximately 540 visiting middle school-aged children and introduced them to the opportunities that await them at the Jack H. Brown College and CSUSB. IECE also received direct feedback from their instructors that the exercise was very well received.
- IECE attended the Trade Adjustment Assistance for Community Colleges and Career Training (TAACCCT) partnership wrap up grant meeting as they are finalizing their grant activities in partnership with Chaffey College, where IECE produced and delivered instructional course series of the Entrepreneurial Technician 1.0 and 2.0 and the Own It! Workshops.
- IECE kicked off their Entrepreneur Professional course in Ridgecrest, CA held at Cerro Coso
 Community College early this month as an ongoing part of our involvement in fulfilling the
 entrepreneurial educational component for the CASCADE grant project with the California
 Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) and the California Governor's
 Office of Planning and Research (OPR).
- Mike Stull and Susie Pryor delivered a presentation for Preview Day for the Presidential Academic Excellence Scholars (PAES) as well, we featured a promotional table for engagement.
- IECE have been planning and preparing for Entrepreneurship Day to be held Nov 1st on the Palm
 Desert campus, kicking off and generating awareness on campus and in the community of the
 coming Entrepreneurship program that will begin in 2019 to Palm Desert.
- The JHBC Student Success Center held its College to Career Workshops on October 5th, 12th, 19th and 26th. The series includes: Résumés 101, Interview Skills, Intro to Internships, and LinkedIn/Networking Basics. These workshops are designed to provide students with the tools for a smooth transition from college to career and to help prepare them for the upcoming JHBC Business Madness Career and Internship Fair in March 2019.

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- The JHBC Student Success Center expanded its JHBC Student Ambassador Program with the addition of two new JHBC Student Ambassadors. The JHBC Student Ambassadors serve as liaisons between JHBC students and JHBC faculty/staff. They inform students about important events and resources within the college, connect with student organizations, and plan student engagement events. In Spring 2018 the JHBC Student Ambassadors organized the JHBC Spring Festival which was attended by over 300 students. The event promoted JHBC student organizations/centers and encouraged engagement amongst students, faculty, and staff. (Fall 2018)
- On October 10, Center for Global Management (CGM) organized an event called "Globales
 Oportunidades". This event was held to inspire and refuel the CSUSB community in honor of
 Hispanic Heritage Month. More than 25 JHBC students participated in this event, receiving advice,
 resources and connections from business professionals who shared their stories of success.
- From August 20th -August 30th, CGM organized First Summer Global Program entrepreneurship: Two week leadership program introducing international students to entrepreneurship concepts and including hands-on projects, local business tours and cultural exchange. Twenty international students from India, Colombia and Korea participated and received recognition certificates after completing this pilot program offered. Students walked away with solid business ideas and the passion to share their experiences with their colleagues at home in efforts to recruit more students next year.

MBA Enrollments update:

- Winter 2018 Admissions: There are currently 36 unique application (32 Traditional, 4 Professional),
 17 are missing transcripts, 19 are with the department (15 Traditional, 4 Professional), 5 are missing department documentation (4 Traditional, 1 Professional), and 9 have been accepted (7 Traditional, 2 Professional). All students are pending enrollment, as dates are not available.
- Student Population: Currently, the MBA stateside program has 206 students enrolled.
- Winter Advising: Winter Advising open advising took place during 10/22 to 10/26. During this time, any student can make an appointment or come in during walk in hours to discuss the upcoming Winter 2019 enrollment.

MBA Retention and Graduation updates:

- Student Success: The MBA program has started working with the Student Success Center to learn about Q2S and how to prepare for the upcoming semester conversion.
- Advising: The MBA program held open and appointment based advising for Winter 2019 registration, so far, over 50 students have participated.
- Office Visits: Ninety eight persons visited the office to ask questions related to degree planning, course selection, withdrawals, degree requirements, academic policies, academic difficulty, and campus resources. (not including phone calls or emails)

MBA Outreach:

- Recruiting: The MBA program attended 7 recruiting events during the month of October, Cal Poly Pomona on 10/9, CSU LA on 10/23, CSUSB Grad Days on 10/23 and 10/24, The Diversity Forum in San Diego on 10/27, Homecoming on 10/27, and UCR Graduate Fair on 10/31.
- MBA Passport

The MBA Passport is finalized with all relevant MBA events. The Passport is given to all MBA students that wish to participate in the MBA passport program. The MBA program is working to develop a Passport program that so the MBA online students can participate.

Resume Workshop

The MBA program in collaboration with the InfoSec Club, held 2 resume workshops. These were held on 10/10 and 10/11; Dr. Pamela Abell presented information to help student hone their resume skills and make themselves look attractive in the job market. The MBA program also offered resume tutoring to assist with any questions after the workshops.

Goal 2

Dr. Anthony Silard facilitated the second of two leadership discussions with 6 IE nonprofit Executive Directors in conjunction with ExecNet in September. Over the past year, Dr. Silard has keynoted/taught leadership development conferences, ranging in length from a few hours to a full day, with over 75 IE nonprofits, including Court Appointed Special Advocates San Bernardino (CASA), One Future Coachella Valley, The Regional Access Project (RAP) Foundation, The Unforgettables Foundation, The Community Foundation (of Riverside and San Bernardino Counties), The California Agricultural Leaders Program and Reach Out. He has also offered conferences and trainings on Work-Life Balance and Collaborative Communication at CSUSB to the University Faculty Mentoring Network (for approximately 40 new faculty), the Division of Student Affairs' Staff Development Committee, and the Palm Desert Campus (the executive team and approximately 40 administrators). On October 23, he conducted a training on Work-Life Balance for the College of Education for 30 administrators.

Goal 3

- The Inland Empire Small Business Development Center (SBDC), a programs of IECE, received funding from Wells Fargo of \$25,000 to support Spanish Language & Veterans Business Services. The SBDC also received \$75,000 in Capital Infusion Funds and \$250,000 in Technical Assistance Expansion Program funds from the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development Small Business.
- Inland Empire Women's Business Center (IEWBC) and Coachella Valley Women's Business Center (CVWBC), programs of IECE, received \$253,846 in grant funding form the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development Small Business Technical Assistance Program (TAP) and Technical Assistance Expansion Program (TAEP) for 2018-19:

- The 2018 Spirit of the Entrepreneur Awards is well under development with ticketing almost sold out at an earlier timeframe than the previous years.
- The MBA program held Fall orientation in conjunction with the College of Extended Learning, allowing a zoom session for all online students. This took place on Sept. 29, 2018. There were 67 on campus MBA students that attended and 3 online MBA students that attended the on campus event.
- MBA Oktoberfest is in the final planning stages; the date has shifted to November and renamed "Fall Fest".
- The MBA program attended 7 recruiting events, CSU LA, Cal Poly Pomona, UCR, Diversity Forum, Grad Days and Homecoming. Other recruiting events are scheduled for later in the quarter.

Goal 4

- Inland Empire Center for Entrepreneurship (IECE) presented the Best of the Best Awards for the Press Enterprise and promoted JHBC to a room full of local professionals.(September 2018)
- IECE and IEWBC supported the Women's Entrepreneurship & Engagement Event with the CSUSB Office of inclusion.
- IECE took part in the CSUSB Grad Days fair activities by presenting at the Career Days at Chaparral High School (Temecula) and Entrepreneur High School (Highland) on careers as an entrepreneur and the benefit of studying entrepreneurship at CSUSB.

Goal 5

- The Institute of Applied Research (IAR) engages in a variety of Projects. Few of them are listed below:
 - Inland Empire Report on Business, a monthly economic forecast report which has been released the first business day of each month since 1993. The report is based on monthly surveys of Purchasing Managers in manufacturing firms, and is patterned after the national report which has been released monthly by the Institute for Supply Management since the 1920s.

- Completed IAR's 21st Inland Empire Annual Survey, a yearly quality of life survey of over 1,000 San Bernardino County residents (and often Riverside County residents as well). This year, sponsors for this project included CSUSB, Mojave Water Agency, Omnitrans, and San Bernardino County Superintendent of Schools.
- O Worked with the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) to conduct a supply chain map of defense department contractors and subcontractors operating in California. The purpose of the mapping study is to improve defense supply chain resilience by identifying contractors and subcontractors that might be at risk in the event of changes in defense spending. Those at-risk companies are then offered services by our statewide partners.
- Conducted a nationwide survey on cybersecurity curricula and industry partnerships. The
 information we collected will be used to prepare a November 1 report to Congress detailing
 a plan for how the Department of Defense can leverage and partner with universities and
 industry on cyber education and training.
- Conducted a study of June 2018 JHBC graduates (BA, BS, MBA, and MSA) to elicit their perceptions of the strengths and weaknesses of their program, and to gather the data required for the BSQ Employment Module, Princeton Business Data Set, and CEO Magazine's rankings of our program.
- Last year, IAR was asked to create an online annual report form which would include evaluative information from Institutions nationwide that hold the designation of "Centers of Academic Excellence." This year we have been asked to participate in the data gathering once again. We are currently preparing the new report form.

College of Education

COE (overall)

• The College of Education collaborated and co-sponsored the 4th Annual *Black and Brown Conference* on November 2. The event welcomed approximately 300-male African American and Latino high school students from various Inland Empire districts. The initial conference began four years ago when these young men were in eighth grade, some of whom have now attended this event on multiple occasions. The focus of this annual event is to connect with the campus community and provide the students with early college awareness, preparedness and information to increase the number of minority males who enroll and graduate from college. Educational Leadership & Technology

- CSUSB's Palm Desert Campus partnered with Cinema Culturas in hosting "Festival en los Campos," a film festival that was held October 25-27 in Palm Desert and surrounding cities. On October 27, PDC hosted an educational roundtable and screening of "El Jeremías," a touching comedy that centers around a talented boy; fun for the whole family. The film was Mexico's entry for the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film. After the film viewing, the educational roundtable allowed CSUSB students, parents and educators to engage the audience (local community) in a discussion about college pathways and the preparation that leads to a college degree, including obstacles they might encounter and the resources they can seek. Cinema Culturas is a collaboration of the University of California Institute for Mexico, the Institute of Cinematography in Mexico, the Riverside Latino Commission in Coachella, and the Riverside County Superintendent of Schools, and other organizations.
- The Ed.D. student candidates begin their first Leadership Cycle for the California Administrator Performance Assessment (CalAPA) on November 9. This required administrator preparation

program has been implemented by the California Teaching Credentialing Commission in order for students to earn the Preliminary Administrative Services Credential. The CalAPA has three cycles that align with the California Assessment Performance Expectations (CAPEs). To demonstrate proficiency of these standards, students must register for the assessments, prepare materials for the performance-based assessments, upload their video to a system and obtain a passing score. The students will submit this Leadership Cycle in December 2018 for review by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CTC).

Special Education, Rehab & Counseling

 Dr. Stacie Robertson (Faculty) was a recipient of The Anthony and Louis Evans Faculty Development Award. Awardees were announced at the Faculty in Excellence in Research and Community Engagement event, held at the Faculty Center for Excellence on October 24. Interim Dean Zhu and SRC's Interim Department Chair, Marc Fudge, surprised Dr. Robertson with the award presentation in front of her EREH-695 class on November 8.

Teacher Education & Foundations

- PBS NewsHour (of Washington, DC) recently interviewed Dr. Enrique Murillo (Faculty) and his student, Aldo, related to the Latinos and Educational Attainment in the IE as well as intersections with our shifting regional economy. PBS program representatives spent several days interviewing and filming Dr. Murillo in various classroom settings, which is scheduled to air nationwide at a later date (TBD).

Biology

Mr. Jason Jung (MS Biology, '18) was awarded Outstanding Graduate Thesis for the university.

Chemistry

- Jeremy Mallari hosted a successful alumni panel featuring four current Ph.D. students in Chemistry from UCR or UCI, and two high school math teachers, for the NSCI 301 class. This class is for incoming S-STEM Scholarship students (funded by the NSF) who are first quarter community college transfer students. Students from our first cohort of S-STEM and other Chemistry majors also attended this event.
- Our VETI-funded ICP-OES, a sophisticated elemental analysis spectrometer for use in analytical chemistry classes and analytical/environmental research has been delivered and is being installed.

HSCI

• Dr. Lal Mian recently returned from two trips, where he chaired the 48th Annual Conference of the Society for Vector Ecology (SOVE) in Yosemite, CA, and 21st Biennial Conference of the European SOVE in Palermo, Italy. In his presidential address in both meetings, Dr. Mian highlighted the historical achievements of the SOVE during the past 50 years. During both conferences, Dr. Mian also presented his current research findings on the year-long efficacy of the insect growth regulator, pyriproxyfen against mosquito developmental stages in cryptic environments (catch basins) in southern California. These findings become an important part of the application for registration of

- this product for mosquito control to the US Environmental Protection Agency. Moreover, Dr. Mian has been Editor of the quarterly *Journal of the American Mosquito Control Association for the last 12 years*. He has also been Editor of the quarterly SOVE Newsletter for the past six years.
- Marwa Mohamed, current MPH student, presented on behalf of Dr. Becerra at ReachOut conference on public health careers.
- Robert Avina, recent MPH graduate and current part-time faculty, as well as current doctoral student at Loma Linda, received National Healthcare Association Certificate for phlebotomy.

tours of the observatory and research telescope(s), and showing various astronomical objects to
the guests using a number of 8 inch instructional telescopes set up in the courtyard.

- CSUSB faculty and staff have team together to take a group of CSUSB students to learn the ancestry of the Inca Empire. The students will participate in service learning projects in the Amazon Jungle

and learn about the indigenous community which resides in one of the most naturally-beautiful and bio-diverse countries on Earth.

Wadi-el-Hudi Expedition to Egypt: Dr. Kate Liszka, Assistant Professor with the Department of
History plans to take a group of CSUSB students for the first time to an archaeological expedition to
Egypt.

Wadi-el-Hudi comprises of 39 archeological sites within a 20 miles radius located in the Eastern Desert southeast of Aswan. These are settlements and work areas are next to ancient gold and amethyst mines that are 2000 to 4000 years old. Students do not go the mines they study the habitations and work areas next to the mines.

- Halloween Party for International Students: CISP joined International Extension Programs in this
 year's Halloween celebration. 127 students gathered at the Yasuda Center to celebrate Halloween.
 Students were exposed to Study Abroad opportunities.
- November Connection: CISP created a survey to inquire international students about their interest
 in joining a family for their traditional Thanksgiving Dinner. Another survey went out to the campus
 community to see how many people are interested in hosting these international students. CISP will

Office of Community Engagement

- Cal State San Bernardino has been named to Washington Monthly's 2018 America's Best Colleges

 commitment to promote civic engagement among the student body, encouraging students to vote
 and actively participate in community decisions.
- Faculty Associate, Cherstin Lyon, presented at the Istanbul Human Security Conference in October in Istanbul about the project she and her students completed with community partner Selin Yildiz Neilsen, co-founder/co-director of Glocally Connected, documenting and co-authoring with refugees their digital-audio stories of migration in Southern California and in Turkey. The presentation highlighted the Office of Community Engagement's new funding strategies in support of ethical faculty-community collaborative teaching. - OCE has partnered with the FCE to launch the inaugural Community Engagement Faculty Leaning
