Methods for Captioning YouTube Videos

Captions can be added to YouTube videos that you own in the following ways:


- Uploading a transcript and setting timings
- Typing a transcript while watching the video and setting timings
- Editing captions automatically generated by YouTube
- Requesting captioning service from the Assistive Technology and Accessibility Center

To begin editing your video, click on the “CC” button in the Edit bar:



Uploading an Existing Transcript or Typing a Transcript in YouTube

If the video you uploaded used a script, you can upload a copy of it into YouTube. Before uploading, convert the file into plain text (.txt). Select “Add new subtitles or CC” and the language.



For videos that have a pre-existing transcript, choose “Upload a file”. For videos that you wish to transcribe within YouTube, select “Transcribe and auto-sync”.

If you are using a transcript, YouTube will prompt you to upload a file. If you don't already have a time-stamped caption file, select "Transcript", then upload the .txt file.

If you have a transcript file: YouTube will import your file into the Video Transcript window pictured below. Make any necessary edits to the script, as certain symbols don't convert well to plain text. Click "Set timings".

If you are typing a transcript in YouTube, type what you hear in the video into the Video Transcript window pictured below. Click "Set timings".

Type everything that's spoken in the video here, then click "Set timings" to automatically line up your text with the speech in the video.



After a few minutes, your script and video will timed. If you find that the captions don't correspond with the words being spoken, you may adjust the timings by clicking and dragging the timing bar at the bottom of the video.



Click "Save Changes" once you are satisfied with your captions.

Uploading Caption Files to Your YouTube Account

Unlike transcripts, caption files are already set with the timings of the video. If you request and receive a caption file (these files usually end in .SRT) from the ATAC, use the steps listed under "Uploading a Transcript", but choose "Subtitles file" as your file type. The file will open in the editor window, as shown below. Make any changes, then click "Save changes".

Editing Automatically-Generated Captions

YouTube typically automatically generates captions for all videos using voice recognition software. These captions are notoriously unreliable and their accuracy can vary wildly due to audio quality, speech clarity, or specialized terminology used. Additionally, auto-generated captions don't utilize punctuation, which can compromise the context and flow of information. However, these captions can make a good starting point for creating accurate caption files in the absence of a transcript. It is important to note that it sometimes takes several hours for the automatic captions to become available after a video is uploaded.

If the captions automatically generated for your video are generally good, you can easily edit them for spelling, punctuation, and grammar.

After clicking on the "CC" button in the Edit Bar, choose "English (Automatic)".

Auto-generated subtitles are not directly editable, so this will create a copy that you can edit. Doing so will overwrite your existing English (Automatic) subtitles.

You can now make changes to the automated captions. Press play and you can listen to the video as you make corrections. Pay special attention to grammar, punctuation, and proper names. The video will automatically pause every time you begin typing.

If you find that the timing of the captions don't correspond with the words being spoken, you may adjust the timings by clicking and dragging the timing bar at the bottom of the video.


